A wave of community spirit swept through downtown Mansfield last Saturday morning as over 200 walkers, representing over 15 churches, laced up their shoes and took to the streets for the annual Walk for Life, hosted by Friends of Richland Pregnancy Services. This year's theme was "Speak Up For Life," based on the Bible verse, Proverbs 31:8

The family-friendly fundraiser began around 10 am at Central Park and wound through a scenic 1.5–2 mile route in the heart of downtown. Participants walked not only to raise awareness, but also to show their support for the free services provided by Richland Pregnancy Services including pregnancy testing, ultrasounds, parenting education, mentoring, and material support.

Local churches, families, and community supporters made up the lively crowd, many of whom came wearing matching shirts or carrying signs in support of life and hope. The event drew online interest from hundreds and served as a visible reminder of the clinic's mission to offer compassion and care to women facing unplanned pregnancies.

As the morning wrapped up, participants gathered back at Central Park for light refreshments, fellowship, and a shared sense of purpose. With smiles, hugs, and a few tired feet, the event ended on a


The Ontario 4th of July Festival will be held Friday, June 27 and Saturday, June 28, at Marshall Park in Ontario.

Ballerina is a very solid entry in this franchise. It's interesting to see Wick as a supporting character though Ana de Armas really steps up and is so great in this role.

While the plot is basically what the original John Wick movie was and not much more than that, the actors, action and re-immersion into this world is plenty enough reason to go see it.

Blood has a shelf life of 42 days, which means ongoing donations are key to ensure medical needs are met.

### Madison holds special meeting to discuss project

The Madison Local Board of Education met for a special meeting on Tuesday, June 3.

The board approved a lease agreement with the Madison Athletic Booster Club for the design and construction of an infill artificial turf multi-purpose athletic field, infill artificial turf baseball infield and infill artificial turf softball field, collectively known as "the turf project."

Board funding for the project includes \$200,000 in grant funding from the Milliron Foundation, a \$125,526 private donation to the baseball team and \$274,474 in permanent improvement funds that include facility rental revenue and funds that have been set aside on an annual basis since the football stadium turf was installed in 2014.

The board approved the agreement for construction services between the Madison Athletic Booster Club and The Motz Group, L.L.C. for the Madison turf field replacement and the baseball and softball conversion project for the limited purposes of being a third-party beneficiary (and permitted assignee) of the rights of the Madison Athletic Booster Club.

A transfer of \$15,000 from the general fund and \$15,000 from the athletic fund to the permanent improvement fund for future turf replacement on the football, baseball, and softball fields was approved. ## A Safe Place for Landon: How Local Care Became a Lifeline for the Canfield Family

For Kelly and Zack Canfield, the Nationwide Children's Hospital Mansfield *Close To Home*<sup>SM</sup> Center has been more than a convenient healthcare resource — it's been a lifeline for their son, Landon.


Landon was diagnosed with Atypical Hemolytic Uremic Syndrome (aHUS) at just two years old, a rare condition that can cause kidney failure. Kelly recalls the terrifying early days when Landon became lethargic and jaundiced, and doctors discovered that his kidneys weren't functioning properly. He was rushed to Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, where the Canfields learned of his life-altering diagnosis.

Fast forward to today: Landon is a vibrant ten-year-old who loves sports, school, and spending time with his friends. Despite the challenges of managing his rare condition, having access to the Nation-wide Children's Mansfield *Close To Home* Center has made all the difference. Just ten minutes from their house, the facility has taken much of the stress out of traveling back and forth to Columbus.

"Having care so close to home has been a game changer," Kelly says. "Our first impression was that they are truly made for kids. From fun Band-Aids and numbing cream to connecting with Landon on a personal level, they make it feel less like a doctor's office and more like a safe space."

"Anytime we call, we're connected directly to a doctor — not an answering service — and they're always there to help, day or night," Kelly explains. The team has even arranged for home infusions every eight weeks to keep Landon stable and prevent flare-ups, sparing him the stress of frequent hospital visits.

Like any ten-year-old, Landon wants to be out playing sports, not stuck in medical appointments. "It definitely takes a toll on him missing things like running races and soccer tournaments," Kelly



says. "But the doctors and nurses at the Mansfield *Close To Home* Center have been so supportive of his well-being."

One doctor in particular has stood out for the Canfield family: Dr. Ray Bignall. "He has a special connection with Landon," Kelly shares. "They talk sports and school, and he really listens and cares. I told him he can't leave until Landon is an adult! He's not just Landon's doctor — he's become a friend." Just recently, the Canfields have also been able to coordinate all of Landon's primary nephrologist visits with Dr. Ray at the Mansfield *Close To Home* Center. During Landon's most recent flare-up last October, the convenience of the center saved the family hours of travel and time away from home. "What used to take up an entire day now only takes a short time," Kelly says.

Financial concerns can weigh heavily on families, but Kelly says Nationwide Children's and the Mansfield *Close To Home* Center have been incredibly understanding. "They really work with you," she says. "Things like penalty-free payment plans make a huge difference."

Perhaps most remarkable is how the timing of Landon's treatment has felt like fate to the Canfields. The medication that helps keep his aHUS in check didn't even exist until the year Landon was born. "That's no coincidence," Zack and Kelly said. "We are truly blessed and thankful for the care and support we've received and truly see this as a God-moment."

As for other families navigating similar challenges, the Canfields give this simple advice: "Don't be afraid to ask questions. Nationwide Children's does a wonderful job of explaining everything to both parents and kids."

For the Canfields, Nationwide Children's Mansfield *Close To Home* Center has been exactly what its name promises: close to home and close to their hearts.

Shaun Coffman, Site Director of the Mansfield *Close To Home* Center, echoes that sentiment of bringing world-class care closer to families. "Our goal is to provide high-quality, specialized care right here in Mansfield — so families like the Canfield's don't have to make long drives for appointments," Coffman explains. "It's about meeting families where they are and making care accessible for all."

A physical therapist by training, Coffman has been with Nation-wide Children's since 2012, starting in the sports and orthopedic therapies department. Over time, he developed a passion for program development and mentoring others, leading him to his current role as Site Director. "Being able to tie Nationwide's broader mission to what we do here has been an amazing opportunity," Coffman says. "I'm proud that we're nationally known for our commitment to the best outcomes and health equity — and now we're bringing that

same level of care and culture right here to Richland County."

Coffman understands the challenges families face when it comes to healthcare, whether it's taking time off work, finding transportation, or simply managing the costs of care. "Having services closer to home definitely helps alleviate that burden," he says.

Located at 536 S. Trimble Rd., the center offers a wide range of pediatric services, including diagnostic and specialty care, behavioral health (Continued on Page 29)





This year's class motto was, "Looking







The Ontario girls have taken the state title for the 4x400 relay in Division II. The team on Arialyn Bischak, Tessa Crum, Sasha Bulakovski and Audrey Mahon crossed the finish line in fine fashion as victors and state champions with a time of 3:52.39.


Not only did they win the state title, but they did it as the first 4x400 track relay team in the history of Ontario.

services, physical, occupational, and speech therapy, radiology, and lab services. Families can also schedule appointments with specialists in areas like cardiology, neurology, and developmental pediatrics all in a familiar, local setting.

"We work closely with local pediatricians and family doctors to ensure seamless care for each child," Coffman notes. "That partnership is kev."

He also highlights the importance of addressing not just physical health, but the whole child — including their emotional and social well-being. "Sometimes families just need to know they're not alone and that we're here to walk alongside them," he says.

Nationwide Children's Hospital is also partnered with Richland Pediatrics, offering primary care in both Mansfield and Shelby, with same-day sick appointments and walk-in hours. "They've integrated behavioral health services too," Coffman adds. ## Local construction projects cause road, ramp closings

Richland County construction projects are anticipated to affect ODOT roadways. All outlined work is weather permitting and is subject to change.

State Route 13 northbound and southbound, from Hanley Road to Chilton Avenue, will have long-term lane closures. The northbound and southbound lanes will be closed. Traffic will be maintained in 10' lanes in each direction with barrels.

The South Main Street entrance ramp to SR 13 north is closed for 60 days for resurfacing work. Access from Chilton Avenue to SR 13 is closed for 60 days. The estimated ramp reopening for both is July 4.

The SR 13 north exit ramp to Cook Road is closed for 60 days. The estimated ramp reopening is Sunday, July 13.

The Cook Road entrance ramp to SR 13 south is closed for 60 days with a reopening date of Friday, Aug. 1.

State Route 39, just south of Leppo Road, will have single lane closures in each direction for a culvert repairs. A minimum of one 11' lane will remain open in each direction. Traffic will be maintained

by flaggers when necessary. Estimated completion is June 2025. Interstate 71 northbound, between SR 39 and U.S. 30, will have single lane closures. Estimated completion in November 2025.

State Route 181 will have single lane closures from just south of Main Street in Crestline to SR 309. Project work includes pavement repairs and bridge maintenance work. Traffic will be maintained by flaggers. Estimated completion is September 2025.

State Route 314 from the Morrow County line to the City of Ontario corporation limits will have single lane closures. Traffic will be maintained by flaggers. Estimated completion is this month.

Beginning the week of June 16, State Route 603 through Richland and Ashland County, from SR 39 to Mowery Road and from the Village of Mifflin to Franklin Church Road, will have single lane closures. Traffic will be maintained by flaggers. Estimated completion is September 2025. Rt. 603 between Welty Road and Schrack Road is closed for a culvert replacement. Estimated completion is June 13.
