The *Scream* franchise has been going strong since 1996 and the seventh installment, *Scream 7*, just raked in more money than all of the rest of them.

Neve Campbell returns as Sidney Prescott. She is raising her teenage daughter, Tatum, while trying to live a normal life with her husband, played by Joel McHale. Soon, a vengeful Ghostface killer is back and out for Sidney's family.

Original writer/director Kevin Williamson returns and brings a great deal of nostalgia to this movie, to good and bad effect. There are some pretty effective kills and Campbell is great back in the lead role. Courtney Cox returns as reporter Gale Weathers and Mason Gooding and Jasmine Savoy Brown return from the previous sequels.

However, this movie has become the worst reviewed of the

bunch. I, personally, did not believe it was as bad as many are saying though the last half of the movie was very lackluster including the anti-climatic reveal of the killers and their identities.

The final chase on the empty streets of Woodsboro is not as interesting as the busy streets of New York City. Also, isolating Sidney and her daughter for the last half is not as much fun as the whole cast being involved.

While *Scream 7* is not as bad as many are saying it still ranks near the bottom. Neve Campbell and the cast do a great job though some obvious scares, decisions by the characters and choices by the writers make this one not as memorable as many of the others.

All orders must be picked up April 10 from 8:30–10 am at the Richland County Fairgrounds Horse Barn. Customers should bring appropriate containers to transport their fish safely. Five-gallon buckets work well but must have an unscented poly liner to ensure fish have enough oxygen during transport. Customers should also have their containers filled one-third full with the pond water the fish will be transferred into.



