## Red Cross facing severe shortage

The American Red Cross now faces a severe blood shortage due to an unprecedented number of blood drive cancellations in response to the coronavirus outbreak. Healthy individuals are needed now to donate to help patients counting on lifesaving blood.

Individuals can schedule an appointment to give blood with the Red Cross by visiting RedCrossBlood.org, using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, calling 1-800-RED-CROSS or enabling the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

As the coronavirus pandemic has grown here in the U.S., blood drive cancellations have grown at an alarming rate.

The Red Cross is adding appointment slots at donation centers and expanding capacity at many community blood drives across the country over the next few weeks to ensure ample opportunities for donors to give.

Volunteer donors are the only source of blood for those

The Red Cross expects the number of cancellations to continue to increase, which is causing heightened concern for blood collection organizations and hospitals across the country. This blood shortage could impact patients who need surgery, victims of car accidents and other emergencies, or patients suffering from cancer.

"In our experience, the American public comes together to support those in need during times of shortage and that support is needed now more than ever during this un-precedented public health crisis," said Chris Hrouda, pres-ident, Red Cross Biomedical Services. "Unfortunately, when people stop donating blood, it forces doctors to make hard choices about patient care, which is why we need those who are healthy and well to roll up a sleeve and give the gift of life.'

The Red Cross is committed to blood drive safety

"We know that people want to help, but they may be

hesitant to visit a blood drive during this time. We want to assure the public that blood donation is a safe process, and we have put additional precautions in place at our blood drives and donation centers to protect all who come out," said Hrouda.

The Red Cross has implemented new measures to ensure blood drives and donation centers are even safer for our donors and staff, including:

•Checking the temperature of staff and donors before entering a drive to make sure they are healthy.

•Providing hand sanitizer for use before the drive, as well as throughout the donation process.

•Spacing beds, where possible, to follow social distancing practices between blood donors.

•Increasing enhanced disinfecting of surfaces and equipment.

At each blood drive and donation center, Red Cross employees already follow thorough safety protocols to help prevent the spread of any type of infection, including:

•Wearing gloves and changing gloves with each donor.

•Routinely wiping down donor-touched areas.

•Using sterile collection sets for every donation.

•Preparing the arm for donation with an aseptic scrub. There is no data or evidence that this coronavirus can be transmitted by blood transfusion, and there have been no reported cases of transfusion transmission for any respiratory virus including this coronavirus worldwide.

Volunteer donors are the unsung heroes for patients in need of lifesaving blood transfusions. If you are healthy, feeling well and eligible to give, please schedule an appointment to give now," added Hrouda.

To donate blood, individuals need to bring a blood

donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification that are required at check-in. Individuals who are (Continued on Page 3)

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## READERS' FORUM

The Ohio School Boards Association, Buckeye Association of School Administrators and Ohio Association of School Business Officials appreciate the changes approved by the Ohio General Assembly aimed at easing the challenges for public school districts and their students during the coronavirus outbreak. This is an unprecedented situation, and the legislature acted swiftly to provide relief for educators and students.

We applaud their work and their willingness to work with our associations to address the needs of our members and Ohio's children.

While districts have been fervent in their efforts to continue to provide educational opportunities for students in creative ways, educators have been worried about meeting student testing and other state requirements. The passage of House Bill (HB) 197 provides relief for school leaders, staff and students.

Other favorable changes include providing local flexibility to grant high school diplomas, waiving retention requirements for the third-grade reading guarantee and permitting boards of education to hold public meetings electronically. HB 197 also would resolve questions around the primary election for school levies, with absentee voting set to end on April 28.

Meanwhile, changes in HB 197 related to the Educational Choice Scholarship Program (EdChoice) will prevent the scheduled list of 1,227 voucher-eligible school buildings from taking effect for the 2020–'21 school year. While we are pleased to see that the implementation of the list will be halted, we will continue to work for long-term changes to the program.

The bill still will allow approximately 500 buildings to remain on the EdChoice eligibility list, and new vouchers will be granted in those districts. Many of the 500 buildings were placed on the eligibility list as a result of a flawed state report card system. These districts will continue to see increases in voucher costs at a time when budgets will be stretched thin as a result of the coronavirus pandemic.

#### U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development awards funds from stimulus bill

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has awarded a total of \$137,446,209 to Ohio state and community governments as the first allocations of Coronavirus stimulus bill. The funding will be allocated across the state in the following programs:

•\$90,919,075 for Community Development Block Grants (CDBG),

•\$45,617,005 for Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG), and

•\$910,129 for support for the Housing Assistance for Persons With AIDS (HOP-WA).

"This funding is a good first step for Ohioans already hurting from the affordable housing crisis," said Senator Sherrod Brown. "But we need to do more and move quicker to get resources to the people who need help while we fight the

coronavirus pandemic."

A recent Coalition on Housing and Homelessness in Ohio (COHHIO) study reported on by Columbus Business First suggests that most Ohio communities lack the resources to protect the homeless population from the coronavirus. According to the COHHIO study, only 46 percent of Ohio communities surveyed reported a joint response plan in place to help the homeless population amid the pandemic – only 22 percent surveyed said they had the resources they need to support homeless communities.

These funds will be allocated as part of the Coronavirus stimulus, which was signed into law.

\$514,410 in Community Development Block Grants has been allocated for Mansfield.

#### Road work begins around county

The US 30 westbound exit ramp to SR 39 northbound will be closed at night from 7 pm to 7 am beginning Monday, April 13, to complete relocation work.

The detour route for motorists headed to SR 39 northbound will continue on US 30 westbound to the Trimble Rd .exit, turn left onto Trimble Rd. and re-enter US 30 eastbound, then take the US 30 eastbound exit ramp to SR 39. The ramp is scheduled to reopen Friday, May 1.

SR 545, just south of Pittenger Rd., will close Monday, April 13, for a culvert replacement.

The detour route for southbound motorists is SR 545 to SR 96, west on SR 96 to SR 13, south on SR 13 to US 30, east on US 30 to SR 545, and reverse for northbound motorists. The road is expected to reopen Monday, April 20.

SR 603, between Pleasant Valley Road and SR 95, will close Monday, April 13 for a maintenance repair project on a retaining wall.

The detour route for motorists headed northbound on SR 603 will travel east on SR 95 to SR 39, northwest on SR 39 to SR 603, and reverse for southbound motorists.

The road is expected to reopen Thursday, May 28.

17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.

Donors can also save up to 15 minutes at the blood drive by completing a RapidPass®. With RapidPass®, donors complete the pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of donation, from a mobile device or computer.

To complete a RapidPass®, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Red Cross Blood Donor App.

Family members caring for their loved ones with Alzheimer's disease or other dementias can continue to gain the support and education they need through digital resources the Alzheimer's Association now offers.

The Alzheimer's Association, Northwest Chapter is offering free virtual education programs and online support groups, in the coming weeks to help caregivers and their families. Clinical experts are also available to create personalized care plans for families seeking help via phone or email through the Care Consultation program.

The association offers a number of education programs that can help those living with Alzheimer's and their families understand what to expect so they can be prepared to meet the changes ahead.

Virtual support groups provide emotional, educational and social support for caregivers and allow participants the opportunity to exchange practical information on care giving challenges and possible solutions, talk through issues, and share feelings, needs and concerns.

"During this challenging time, it's critical that all Ohio caregivers have access to Alzheimer's Association resources even if they cannot venture out," said program director, Pam Myers. Richland County Children Services kicked off April's National Child Abuse Prevention Month with Pinwheels for Prevention at the Richland County Courthouse on Wednesday, April 1. RCCS staff placed 1,260 Blue Pinwheels on the front lawn of the Richland County Courthouse, 50 Park Ave. East.

The 1,260 blue pinwheels represent every report of abuse or neglect received

by the Agency in 2019.

The blue pinwheels are a reminder that every child deserves a safe, happy and permanent home. The blue pinwheel has become a national symbol for child abuse prevention. According to the Ohio Children's Trust Fund, every 30 minutes a child is abused or neglected in Ohio.

RCCS will receive proclamations from the Richland County Commissioners and mayors from surrounding cities in Richland County recognizing National Abuse Prevention Month.

RCCS also participated in the annual statewide "Wear Blue Day" on Wednesday, April 8. Wear Blue Day is an annual statewide event to spread awareness on the important issues of child abuse, neglect and dependency. Anyone who wore blue to show support of child abuse

## Extension granted for veterans' benefits filing

U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary, Robert Wilkie, approved an extension for filing of claims and appeals for veterans' compensation benefits.

Due to the Department of Veterans Affairs closing regional offices, Board of Veterans' Appeals hearings have been postponed until at least May 1. Under current law, an extension to the 60-day period for filing a Substantive Appeal or to the 30-day period for responding to the Supplemental Statement of the Case may be granted for good cause.

Veterans can submit their late benefits claims paperwork along with a request for an extension. Veterans do not have to request an extension ahead of time.

This applies to perfecting claims, challenging adverse decisions, submitting Notices of Disagreement, submitting Substantive Appeals and responding to Supplemental Statements of the Case






