### Voter registration deadline is April 5 for May Primary

The deadline to register to vote or change an address and/or name in the voter registration system for the May 4, 2021 Primary/Special Election is Monday, April 5. The Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm.

The office is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave. Suite 101 in the Longview Center. After 4 pm, visitors must use the entrance at the lower level back parking area at the southwest corner of the building.

Qualifications for registering to vote are: •must be either a native U.S. citizen, or a naturalized citizen of the U.S.

•must be a resident of Richland County and Ohio 30 days prior to an election

•must be a minimum of 18 years of age by the date of the General Election on or before Nov. 2

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person. Voters who are currently registered in Ohio may their address online at change https://www.ohiosos.gov/elections/voters/, but must do it by the April 5 deadline. Online registration is also now available on this site.

In addition to the board of elections office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at the following locations in Richland County:

•Any library branch

•All city and village hall offices •The Bureau of Motor Vehicles Office •The Department of Human Services

•The Richland County Courthouse (recorder or treasurer offices)

•All area high school offices

Registration forms may also be obtained at vote.richlandcountyoh.gov or requested by mail. Call 419-774-5530 to have a form sent by mail. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days prior to Election Day.

Please be aware that not all precincts within Richland County will be open for the May 4 Election. All precincts in the City of Mansfield will be open and those voters can request a Republican or Issues Only ballot. All four precincts in the City of Ontario will be open with only the Charter Formation Issue on their ballot. No City of Shelby precincts will be open.

No polling places have been changed permanently, however, the board did approve a temporary change for the 15 voters in the Jeff-A precinct split who reside in the Washington Township portion, and the 200 voters in the Lex-B Washington Township split. These voters will be notified to go to Resurrection Parish, 2600 Lexington Ave. for this election only, in order to save funds by not opening a separate polling place for those few voters.

### **Richland County children** will receive 300 pair of shoes

Children from low income families in and his team at GOFBCI." Richland County will receive brand new athletic style shoes courtesy of Ohio Governor, Mike DeWine's Office of Faith Based and Community Initiatives (GOFBCI).

The GOFBCI will provide 300 pairs of Operation Warm shoes to children in Richland County through a collaboration with the North End Community Improvement Collaborative (NECIC), the Mansfield Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance (MIMA) and We ACT.

Last year, the GOFBCI office partnered with Operation Warm, a national nonprofit that manufactures brand-new coats for children in need, to launch a pilot that provided brand-new shoes. The program was executed in partnership with Community Action Agencies and gifted new shoes to over 5,000 children across the state of Ohio.

2020 marked a milestone for Operation Warm, as they gifted their 4 millionth brand-new coat, and now, the nonprofit has expanded its mission to include brand-new shoes. "Last year, our survey data told us that in addition to coats, shoes were an essential need for the children we serve," said Grace Sica, Executive Director for Operation Warm. "We responded with a pilot program that distributed 10,000 pair of brand-new shoes in select U.S. markets. The feedback from teachers, parents, and the kids has been resoundingly positive. This initiative would not have been possible without support from partners like Ohio Governor DeWine

"We, at NECIC, are grateful for the opportunity to support this initiative of Operation Warm with our community partners, We ACT, MIMA, and Governor Mike DeWine's Office of Faith Based and Community Initiatives to provide shoes for 300 children in our community. Working together with across various sectors to meet even the most basic needs of our local children, builds and strengthens our relationships, and ultimately enriches our community." The shoes are being distributed at NECIC, 134 N. Main St., Mansfield, Ohio. Parents/guardians must complete a TANF online on form the NECIC website/Facebook page or pick up a form at NECIC.

Parents/guardians will receive a call from a representative from NECIC to schedule an appointment time to pick up the shoes.

Parent/guardian must bring a form of ID and a copy of the completed TANF form to the appointment. (The form will require social security numbers and dates of birth for all household members.) Birth certificates and social security cards will not be needed at the appointment.

The statewide mask mandate will be followed. Masks are required during the appointment and will be provided.

The board accepted the resignation of Kimberle Soresen, eighth grade literature teacher, for retirement at the end of her 2021-'21 contract. Lola Cline, secretary to the director of education, will also retire at the end of the 2020-'21 contract.

Resignations were accepted from Regina These, high school English teacher; Scott Bloom, high school mathematics teacher; and Joe Balough, career based intervention teacher; all effective at the end of their 2020-'21 contracts.

The resignation of Cindy Kleilein, bus driver, was accepted effective March 19.

The board improved the employment of Jim Buker as a retire/rehire high school industrial technology teacher for the 2021-'22 school year.

One-year retire/rehire contracts were awarded for 2021-'22 to Judy Schnug, guidance office secretary; Eva Harmon, food service manager; and Anita Them, administrative assistant/EMIS coordinator.

The board moved to increase the hourly rate of substitute bus drivers from \$15.50 per hour to \$18 per hour (2.25 hours per route), effective March 8.

Extracurricular/Supplemental contracts for 2020-'21 were awarded to David Whittaker, high school assistant track coach, \$2,963; Jeromy Bolen, volunteer assistant track coach, no pay; and Sara Mosier, volunteer assistant track coach, no pay.

The board approved Tim Henige, \$16 hourly; Kolten Kurtz, \$10 hourly; and Zach McCristall, \$10 hourly; for summer help with facility and transportation maintenance for 2021. All are effective May 3.

#### Margherita Chicken

Ingredients

- 2 chicken breasts, cut in half and flattened
  1/2-1 cup flour (sprinkle salt and pepper
  2 eggs
  1 cup bread crumbs
- 2 cups tomato sauce

1 log of fresh mozzarella (if you get one that is already sliced, it will make things much easier)

Fresh basil leaves

#### Instructions

Dip chicken in flour, egg and bread crumbs and bake at 350 degrees for 20–25 minutes. Remove chicken from oven, cover with some sauce, a piece of mozzarella and a few basil leaves. Put back in the oven for 10 minutes until the sauce is heated and mozzarella begins to melt. You also want to make sure your chicken is 165–170 degrees and fully cooked. (Time will always vary depending on how thick your chicken breasts are). Sprinkle with some fresh parmesan cheese if you would like. (Bone-in chicken breasts can be used if preferred).

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**OHIO NATIONAL GUARD MEMBERS** have completed a mission in Southern Ohio where they helped clear nearly 230 miles of roadway during a 15-day activation. Gov. Mike DeWine directed members to assist with ice storm cleanup and debris removal in Gallia and Lawrence counties. Approximately 60 Soldiers from the Army National Guard's 1191st Engineer Company, based in Portsmouth, and 40 Airmen from the Air National Guard's 200th RED HORSE (Rapid Engineer Deployable Heavy Operations Repair Squadron Engineers) Squadron, based in Port Clinton and with a detachment in Mansfield, began supporting local authorities on Feb. 21 and finished on Sunday, March 7. The Soldiers and Airmen used chain saws, wood chippers, front-end loaders and other heavy equipment to clear away fallen trees and other debris clogging critical infrastructure. They hauled away about 490 loads in dump trucks. Currently, hundreds of guard members are activated to assist in the state's response to COVID-19 at food banks, vaccination clinics and personal protective equipment (PPE) and vaccine warehouses.

#### Public school leaders support bipartisan reform of state report card system

The Ohio School Boards Association (OSBA), Buckeye Association of School Administrators (BASA) and Ohio Association of School Business Officials (OASBO) reacted to the introduction of bipartisan legislation to reform the state's report card system.

Sponsored by Reps. Don Jones (R-Freeport) and Phillip M. Robinson Jr. (D-Solon), the bill would eliminate Ohio's A–F letter grades and overall ratings for school districts and public schools.

"Nothing about an overall school letter grade properly informs a parent or community about what is going on in their schools," OSBA Chief Executive Officer Rick Lewis said. "Just as every student is more than a test score, every school district is more than a letter grade."

Schools would receive one of six ratings for their performance across five areas. Modeled after Massachusetts' school evaluation system, the ratings would include: significantly exceeds expectations; exceeds expectations; meets expectations; making substantial progress toward expectations; making moderate progress toward expectations; and in need of support. The five components graduation, achievement, progress, gap closing and thirdgrade reading guarantee — already exist under current law but are refined by the bill.

The bill is the product of a legislative report card study committee convened in 2019. The 10-member panel also included three school superintendents, each representing an urban, suburban and rural community.

"The legislation unveiled today is the culmination of many years of hard work," BASA Executive Director Dave Axner said. "It serves as an important step in improving the state report card so it is a more fair, accurate reflection of the great work being done in Ohio's schools. This new system will create a transparent report card that informs students, parents, educators and communities, leading to a culture of continuous improvement and excellence in Ohio's education system."

OASBO Executive Director Jim Rowan said, "These positive enhancements will allow school districts and schools to tell their stories beyond the test scores that measure a mere snapshot in time. 






**Count the Kicks app can save lives** 

Cathleen Wolff never expected that downloading the Count the Kicks app to monitor her baby's movements during pregnancy would help save her daughter's life. She learned about Count the Kicks through educational materials provided by the Ohio Department of Health and discussed the importance of tracking her baby's movements with her doctor.

Recently, she was in her eighth month of pregnancy when she noticed a change in her baby's normal movements - a significant development that needed to be addressed.

After noticing it was taking her baby longer than usual to get to 10 movements and that her baby's movements weren't as strong as usual, Cathleen alerted her doctor who started testing right away and determined her baby would need to be delivered.

"It was immediately discovered that Margot had a complete knot in her cord, that the cord was wrapped around her neck two times, and her hands were also tethered by the cord. Thankfully, she was healthy and after a very brief stay in the NICU was able to come home to our family," Cathleen said. "I am very fortunate that my OB office shared the Count the Kicks information with me through posters on the room walls and a brochure, as it encouraged me to download and regularly use the Count the Kicks app, which is how I knew that my baby's normal movement pattern had changed."

Count the Kicks, an evidence-based public health campaign, educates and empowers expectant parents to track their baby's movements in the third trimester of pregnancy. Research shows a change in a baby's movements could be the earliest, and sometimes only indication that something may be wrong with a

pregnancy. Thanks to a partnership with the Ohio Department of Health, nurses, doctors and hospital staff have been able to order free Count the Kicks brochures, app download reminder cards, and posters to place in offices that care for pregnant patients and to share with expectant parents since 2018.

Ohio Department of Health, along with many other organizations in Ohio, are committed to reducing stillbirths through increasing awareness and community intervention. This is the second baby that we know of to be saved in Ohio through the Count the Kicks awareness campaign.

After a few sessions on the free Count the Kicks app, parents will start to notice a normal movement pattern for their baby.

Changes to that pattern can indicate potential issues with the pregnancy. Parents who notice a change should call their healthcare provider immediately. Every year in the U.S. 24,000 babies are born still, according to the CDC. Stillbirth affects every 1 in 167 pregnancies in the United States.



**March 18, 1969** — U.S. B-52 bombers are diverted from their targets in South Vietnam to attack suspected communist base camps and supply areas in Cambodia for the first time in the war. President Nixon approved the mission–formally designated Operation Breakfast–at a meeting of the National Security Council on March 15. This mission and subsequent B-52 strikes inside Cambodia became known as the "Menu" bombings. A total of 3,630 flights over Cambodia dropped 110,000 tons of bombs during a 14-month period through April 1970. This bombing of Cambodia and all follow up "Menu" operations were kept secret from the American public and the U.S. Congress because Cambodia was ostensibly neutral. To keep the secret, an intricate reporting system was established at the Pentagon to prevent disclosure of the bombing. Although the New York Times broke the story of the secret bombing campaign in May 1969, there was little adverse public reaction. (www.history.com)
