Madison Trustees welcome new fire chief

During the meeting of the Madison Township Trustees held at the meeting hall, Madison Township Trustee chair Jim Houser swore in 47-year-old Kenneth Justus as the new fire chief.

Justus comes to Madison with over 30 years of experience. While in high school, he worked as a dispatcher for the Village of Hiram, OH. We most recently served at the Mantua-Shaferville Fire and Police Department.

"At the present I have no plans to make any changes, as first I want to get to know all my employees," said Justus. " I will also continue to work on grants as we need new fire stations.'

During the meeting the trustees opened a bids for tar and chip from EarthWorm Consruction for \$188, 903.92; The Shelly Co., \$122,758,00; Henry W. Bergman Inc., \$115,482.50 and Allied Construction, \$105,873.71.

A road resurfacing cooperative agreement was reached between Madison Township and Springfield Township for the chip and seal of Leppo Rd. Springfield Township will furish half the cost.

The Lexington Board of Education met Wednesday, March 17, with president Robert Whitney calling the meeting to or-

A TDA Presentation was given followed by the junior high report from Taylor Gerhardt and a report from Sydnee Detlef, student representative to the board.

The treasurer's report was given and a

resolution was approved accepting the amounts and rates as determined by the budget commission and authorizing the necessary tax levies and certifying them to the county auditor.

A donation was accepted of an electromagnetic sprayer and disinfectant from Local Project Pro valued at approximately \$800.

A resolution authorizing the purchase of competitive retail electric service from the lowest responsible bid for the period July 2022 billing and terminating no later than the June 2027 billing cycle through META Solutions purchasing cooperative.

The resignation of Sara Thorburn as academic challenge co-advisor for the 2021-22 school year was accepted.

Stephanie Blackstone and Jane Goodall were employed as tutors for third grade students, no more than five hours per week, \$20 per hour through the end of July 2021.

The board accepted the resignation of Sherri Johnston, high school attendance secretary, effective Aug. 6, 2021. Deb Wisenbarger, Central secretary, also resigned, effective July 31, 2021.

Kristi Larson will retire as an educational aide at Western, effective June 30, 2021.

Janice Knox was employed as a longterm food service sub, effective March 4,

Coaching resignations were accepted from Alicia Bailey, freshman cheerleading advisor and Dave Kaple, varsity assistant football.

Lisa Pfizenmayer was approved as a junior high track coach.

The board moved to approve the school calendars for the 2021'22 and 2022-'23 school years.

The purchase of one 84-passenger school bus from Cardinal Bus Sales totaling \$101,859 was given approval. This total includes all spare parts, warranties and the trade-in deduction.

The Lexington Board of Education will send a resolution notifying the Ohio Department of Education of the district's intent to administer the Third Grade English Language Arts and Third Grade Mathematics assessments in paper format for the 2021-'22 school year.

The board approved the revised Lexington substitute list dated Feb. 17, 2021, as presented by MOESC.

A resolution approving the Construction Development (CD) Phase Submissions for the new 7-12 school was accepted.

The board approved a proposal from Front & Center Turf to maintain the high school football and soccer fields.

Discussion items included a tax incentive review and quarantine changes.

Baskets will contain items for outdoor


activities, books, things to build, school supplies, candy, games to play with family and crafts to make.

The First and Last Diesel Locomotives

At first glance one might think they are looking at a rather mundane photograph and wonder why the picture was taken. Perhaps it recorded a moment in history. Thus it was that Lexington B&O Station Agent Nelson Lewis grabbed the camera and snapped a picture of the first B&O Diesel to make the Willard to Newark run. It was a moment in history as nothing but steam engines had trod those rails.

Engine 105 was one of the first 12 diesels purchased by the railroad during World War II. Built by General Motors Electromotive Corp., each section of the two-unit locomotive had a 1,350 horsepower 16-cylinder engine. The train master at Newark figured the diesels were more powerful than the steam engines and

hooked on a long north-bound train.

All went well to Lexington but it stalled on the 87 half foot to a mile grade to Alta. That was the steepest grade on the B&O between Newark and Sandusky.

The last B&O locomotive to leave Lexington station left on April 22, 1987. A good-sized crowd was on-hand to witness the sad event.

Engineer J.W. McClain, brakeman C.J. Hall and conductor Donald Paxton pulled EMD 2,000 horsepower engine #3745 from the old station, dragging and loading two quarter mile-long rails with them. The rails slid onto a string of special-made

A multiple Oscar nominee this year is director Lee Isaac Chung's Minari. This story is about an immigrant family in the

1980s that moves from California to Arkansas to start over again and hopefully start their own business.

The family patriarch Jacob (The Walking Dead's Steven Yeun, who received his first Oscar nomination) wants to start growing and selling his own vegetables and enlists the help of a local man (Will Patton) to make a garden. Jacob also moves into a mobile home with his wife and two young children which disappoints his wife Monica (Han Ye-ri) who

does not quite understand why Jacob decided to make this drastic change.

Writer/director Chung shows us this family's frustrations, anguish and the struggle to achieve their goals. Along the way the children's grandmother (Youn Yuh-jung) moves in with them. Yuh-jung steals every scene she is in and gives one of the best performances featured in the supporting actress Oscar category because of the journey her characters takes.

Chung drops us into this family's lives and it feels like we are truly watching a

chapter in anyone's lives, which gives credit to Chung for making this family so relevant in the time the movie is set, as

well as today. The movie is in both Korean and English and that's a good approach to take as this is an American-made film but makes everything very unique (there has been some controversy as to other awards organizations deeming it a foreign film). The cast is so winning, and through this family's ups and downs, there are many memorable moments, especially involving young Alan Kim who plays Jacob's son David.

Minari is available on demand now and is definitely one to watch as this is a wonderful movie about a family struggling to make their dreams comes true while going through good times and bad. Chung makes a movie that is full of heart and deserves to be recognized.

The Mansfield Art Center has created a way to bring recognition to and show the artistic talents of regional high school, junior high and grade school students and

School, Sherman, Springmill, Prospect, Woodland, Discovery, St. Peter's, Spanish Immersion, Tyger Digital Academy and Gold Digital Academy. Also, students are

representing Mans-field Art Center field Art through our MAC 21st Century S.T.E.A.M. program, Accelerated and Visual Arts Program and Tiger S.T.E.A.M. after school program. According to Dr.

Debra Weaver, program director for the art center, "more than 105 pieces of art will be displayed by our younger students, not just in the Elizabeth Thomas Black Gallery, but throughout our whole art education wing. The kids have been so productive and creative, we needed to use our entire space."

Deadline approaching for May Primary voter registration

The deadline to register to vote or change an address and/or name in the voter registration system for the May 4, 2021 Primary/Special Election is Monday, April 5. The Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm.

The office is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave. Suite 101 in the Longview Center. After 4 pm, visitors must use the entrance at the lower level back parking area at the southwest corner of the building.

Qualifications for registering to vote are: •must be either a native U. S. citizen, or a naturalized citizen of the U.S.

•must be a resident of Richland County and Ohio 30 days prior to an election

•must be a minimum of 18 years of age by the date of the General Election on or

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person. Voters who are currently registered in Ohio may change their address online at https://www.ohiosos.gov/elections/voters/, but must do it by the April 5 deadline. Online registration is also now available on this site.

In addition to the board of elections office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at the following locations in Richland County:

•Any library branch

•All city and village hall offices

•The Bureau of Motor Vehicles Office

•The Department of Human Services

•The Richland County Courthouse (recorder or treasurer offices)

•All area high school offices

Registration forms may also be obtained at vote.richlandcountyoh.gov or requested by mail. Call 419-774-5530 to have a form sent by mail. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days prior to Election Day.

Please be aware that not all precincts within Richland County will be open for the May 4 Election. All precincts in the City of Mansfield will be open and those voters can request a Republican or Issues Only ballot. All four precincts in the City of Ontario will be open with only the Charter Formation Issue on their ballot. No City of Shelby precincts will be open.

No polling places have been changed permanently, however, the board did approve a temporary change for the 15 voters in the Jeff-A precinct split who reside in the Washington Township portion, and the 200 voters in the Lex-B Washington Township split. These voters will be notified to go to Resurrection Parish, 2600 Lexington Ave. for this election only, in order to save funds by not opening a separate polling place for those few voters.






