Signal changes begin at US 42, Michigan Ave. intersection The signal at the intersection of U.S. 42 and Michigan days, while the signals are on flash, to determine if the

The signal at the intersection of U.S. 42 and Michigan Ave., in the Madison area, was switched to a yellow/red flash and changed to a two-way stop control.

On US 42, the existing stop bars were removed and "Signal Under Study For Removal" signs were added at the signal heads. Also, stop signs and stop bars were added to Michigan Ave.

The signal removal study is being conducted because the low traffic volumes on Michigan Ave. do not warrant a signal at the intersection.

ODOT will continue to monitor the intersection for 90

days, while the signals are on flash, to determine if the removal process will proceed. Any crashes during this time will be reviewed and comments or feedback will be accepted from motorists.

After this time, if the signals are deemed removable, signal heads will be covered or removed traffic will continue to be monitored for another 60 days before the signal would be permanently removed.



A Quiet Place Part II is a terrific sequel to 2019's A Quiet Place. This movie was so unique because much of it was quiet,

forcing moviegoers to accept a movie in the theater like that instead of the big explosions and sounds that usually go with the theater experience. This is also the movie that got this critic back to the cinema.

John Krasinski directs and writes this movie with such a steady hand. We are reunited with the character of Lee (Emily Blunt) who along with her three children including son Marcus (Noah Jupe) and daughter Regan (Millicent Simmonds). The story picks up where the original left off with this family trying to

original left off with this family trying to stay as quiet as they can living in a world where alien monsters will kill them if they hear the slightest sound. She meets up with a man from their past named Emmett (Cillian Murphy) who travels with Regan on a trip to hopefully find a way to do away with the creatures.

A Quiet Place II is just as good of a movie as the original, which is rare. The sound is done so well going between noise and silence and the thrills and scares are back, but it's so interesting that Krasinski decided to make this a family drama first. The opening scene of day one

of this event is really something to see.

On a personal note, I definitely recommend going to see this movie in a theater as I did. As more people get vaccinated and things seem to be opening up more,

going to the movies is so important and a great experience.

I remember being upset at a fellow moviegoer next to me who was eating popcorn during the quiet moments of the original movie, just an example of what memories the theater experience provides. It was great getting a popcorn and a drink and enjoying that experience for the first time since *Tenet* last summer.

Absolutely check out A Quiet Place Part II. If you

enjoyed the original you will absolutely enjoy this one and getting to see these great performances and again Krasinski showing what a great director he is becoming is very positive for the industry. I will give this movie three stars but ask me tomorrow and it may be a half star higher. This one provides a great time at the movies

Plant sale will feature native plants

As gardening season gets underway, Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD) encourages residents to go native when planning a garden or landscape. Going native means utilizing native plants because of their many benefits.

Native plants are more suited to our climate and soil and typically do better in our gardens than non-native species. They also provide excellent habitats and food for insects, pollinators, and wildlife. Because they have a strong root system, more soil is held in place which slows stormwater runoff, helps prevent soil erosion and filters pollutants before they enter rivers, lakes and streams.

Richland SWCD is hosting a Native

Plant Sale in conjunction with Natives in Harmony on Tuesday, June 15, from 4-6 pm in the front parking lot of the Richland County Longview Center, 1495 W. Longview Ave., Mansfield. Plants cost \$3 per plug, \$6 per quart and \$10 for gallon sizes. Species are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Garden gloves will be available to purchase at \$5 per pair.

There will be table exhibits about container gardening and "greenhouse" cover to extend the growing season, ideas for plant markers, including how to use recycled materials and soil testing information.

1 bunch scallions or green onions diced about 1/8" thick

2 oranges we will use the juice and the zest from the oranges

3/4 cup honey (I like raw but any honey will do)

Instructions

Pat your chicken thighs dry on paper towels and season with salt and pepper. Over medium heat add your oils and toss in the chopped scallions. Sauté the scallions for a minute or so and remove from skillet. We want a decent amount of oil on pan, so before we add the thighs, if you think the pan might be a little dry or lacking in oil, go ahead a put some more in. Turn heat up on skillet, almost high but more than medium. We are going to cook the thighs on both sides until they are golden brown, 3 minutes per side. Turn heat to low after browning the thighs.

Once the thighs are golden brown and you've turned your heat down, take honey and coat the tops of all the thighs. (I said ¾ of a cup, but make sure they are all covered, so use a little more if needed.) Cut oranges in half (make sure you have zested them already) and squeeze the juice from the oranges over all of the chicken. Take the scallions that you set aside and toss them over the chicken. Use cover (or tin foil) and cover the skillet, place in your preheated oven for 25 minutes. Remove from oven and add the orange zest.

How to create the perfect outdoor living and work room

Spring is here, and it's time for pandemic-weary homeowners to ready yards and landscapes for backyarding. Yes, backyarding is a word — and one that we all need right now.

The pandemic thrust us into a new reality, and the backyard has a starring role. With a year of limitations on where we go, how we gather and who we connect with, yards and other managed landscapes became a safe haven.

Backyarding became a way of life as lawns, gardens, patios and decks evolved into outdoor offices, classrooms, family gathering places and the new 'hot spots' in our neighborhoods. So how is the backyard set up to meet all of these needs?

Create activity zones. Consider what needs to happen in the backyard and map activity areas. A shady table can double as a home office, study zone, art table or dining spot. A hammock or outdoor sofa can suffice for napping, reading or studying. A patch of sturdy grass is perfect for sports, family games and play.

A fire pit offers cozy chairs for star gazing and socializing, while a grill near a seating area promises delicious meals. A wall, fence, or pergola may hold an outdoor movie screen for nighttime viewing. An herb or vegetable garden helps kids learn about science and nutrition while reaping the satisfaction of growing food for the table.

Factor functionality with purpose. Is there a quiet spot for conference calls? Or a shady spot that minimizes glare for online video meetings? Note where electrical outlets are and if an outdoor-rated extension cord will be needed to accommodate all of the electronics that may be used outside. Check wifi coverage and cell service in the yard and determine if there is enough comfortable seating.

Spruce up existing landscaping. Assess the backyard and do some basic "clean up." Fix bare patches in the grass. Use a leaf blower to clean out flower beds. Prune bushes and trees. Cut the grass to a healthy height. Add a fresh layer of mulch around your trees and in flower beds. Freshen up by weeding, planting flower beds, and filling pots with colorful flowers

- •High fructose corn syrup (found in packaged products)
 - •Sugary drinks (soda, sweet tea)

and verdant plants.

Use plants and shrubs to hide unsightly items and control noise. Trees, shrubs and bushes offer cover from neighbors, deliver shade, camouflage unsightly pool equipment and air handlers, and tamp down noise. Planters with flowers between seating and eating areas on a patio add visual interest and privacy. Shrubs and tall plants are a terrific privacy-creator (and noise canceller for those conference calls).

Put the right plant in the right place. Choosing the right plants for the climate zone and for your lifestyle will create a backyarding space that is attractive. It will also be easier to maintain, and support pollinators and wildlife. Consider watering and sunlight or shade needs for any plants added. A hardy grass variety is more likely to hold up to pets and kids. Save delicate flowering plants for patio containers, and be sure to check out the ASPCA list of toxic plants to keep pets safe.

Invite the outdoors in. Blending interior

Invite the outdoors in. Blending interior and outdoor living spaces helps the back-yard feel like an extension of the home. Open blinds and curtains to the yard. Use complementary indoor and outdoor décor in similar colors, materials and styles to create a cohesive space. This enables everyone to transition seamlessly from indoor life to outdoor living.









Resolution to call for a Convention of States to be introduced

State Rep. Riordan McClain (R-Upper Sandusky) and State Rep. Craig S. Riedel (R-Defiance) have announced that they will soon introduce a resolution to call for a Convention of States, as outlined in Article V of the U.S. Constitution. The action would put Ohio on a list with 15 other states who have already passed a similar subject resolution to reign in the federal government. A convention will only convene once 2/3 of the 50 states (34 of the total) have passed a similar subject resolution.

"The size and scope of the federal government have long been unsustainable, and we have waited long enough for Congress to fix itself," said McClain.

Article V provides for two mechanisms for Constitutional amendments to be proposed. The first is through direct Congressional action and the second is a call from the states for a convention.

The process for a Convention of States is as such:

•A call for a Convention of States within the same subject matter must be passed by resolution in 2/3 of the states.

Once 34 states have done so, a Convention will be called by Congress in which all 50 states sends a delegation. Each state delegation receives one vote on each proposition of the Convention.

•At the Convention, proposed amendments within the outlined subject matter require a simple majority (26) of states to be accepted.

•The accepted amendments then must then be ratified by the legislatures in 3/4 of the states. (38)

This resolution limits the proposed amendment subject matter to: limiting the

power and jurisdiction of the federal government, term limits for Congress and other government officials, and fiscal restraints for the federal government.

I support term limits for office members of the U.S. Senate and the U.S. House of Representatives because it holds public officials accountable throughout their political careers," said Riedel.

"This resolution aims to increase the opportunity for competition for new members to bring diverse ideas and experiences to reviewing and amending federal laws while providing a necessary check on the current power of the Legislative Branch."

The road to this end will be long and arduous, but the task at hand is critical to the sustainability of this great Republic that we share," McClain added.

McClain and Riedel intend to introduce the resolution this week.
