# High school students attend EmployMEpalooza

Last Thursday, April 27, high school students from across Richland County showcased their skills and interest with the hopes of becoming employed. These ambitious students stood at their own booths, where employers came to meet them at this "Reverse Job Fair" called EmployMEpalooza. The event took place from 10 am to noon at Mid Ohio Educational Service Center.

The Richland Area Chamber of Commerce and Ohio Means Jobs (OMJ) collaborated to give local Richland County employers the opportunity to meet high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors who are seeking internships, seasonal work, part-time, and full-time work after graduating.

These students worked with faculty and mentors who helped them prepare for this event. It was inspiring to hear everything about their interests, skills, and aspirations. These students had resumes prepared and gathered items displaying their achievements, interests and goals, which gave employers an idea of what they would be like as an employee.

Clint Knight, Director of Workforce Development, had this to say, "I am working to create talent pipelines between our local education partners and employers. This work includes K–12 education, Career Tech Schools, Colleges and Universities, and Adult Education. It's important that we partner with all levels of education and training so that we meet the needs of both the job seekers and the companies who want to employ them. Workforce Development is a large-scale effort in our region that involves many partners who are working together for the same goal. Our regional Chambers, economic development entities, social services, and educators are frequently at the table together. They work together to ensure that resources align so that we can properly support the economic health of our region."

"EmployMEpalooza is an event that aims to create an efficient resource for our high school students to explore opportunities and get employed. The event is made possible by the partnership of Richland County Job and Family Services, The Richland Area Chamber & Economic Development, Catalyst Life Services, and the Career Coaches in local High Schools. By bringing the employers to the students, it raises the bar of expectations. The students prepare themselves to meet multiple employers over the course of two hours and share their skills and interests. It's a great opportunity for students to learn more about the available careers in our region, as well as a chance for the employers to get a better understanding of what our young people want to do - and how they communicate," said Knight.

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# The Big Noise In Little Washington

In the late 1800s, neither Bellville or Lexington had a town band. When Decoration Day (now Memorial Day) rolled around, a parade was held with veterans and families marching to the local grave yards and placing flowers on loved ones grave. This was a solemn occasion without music, so what was needed was a band.

As both towns at the time were destitute of brass and drum groups, at times they were forced to hire outside musicians. Thus the Little Washington Band came to the rescue.

The 12-member band unit was all drum and fife with a member carrying an American Flag. Only two members are identified in the above photo. In the back row, second from the left is A. B. "Barney" Pulver. He would later be elected as Richland County Sheriff and, with no police training, went into office just as the 1900 Dowie riots rocked Mansfield. At far right is his son, Clayton T. Pulver, with the big drum.

The band members must have come from the area as many of the Pulvers, Banks, McFarlands, Pierces and Harings in Pleasant Valley were inter-related. Who organized the group is unknown.


Whether they were paid by the veterans groups or not is also unknown. Perhaps they were paid in free meals and quite a few drinks.

Little Washington wasn't the only crossroad community with a band. Steam Corners also had its own group of horn tooters. The band was also hired to do a march in Lexington on Decoration Day by the Conger Post of the GAR. This must have embarrassed both Bellville and Lexington.

In the decades that followed, Bellville grew a great band and built the magnificent Victorian band stand on the town square, which is

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still the pride of the community.

Lexington also acquired a great band complete with uniforms and also erected a band shell, although not as beautiful as Bellville. It was torn down in he 1950s when thoughtless officials had it condemned by the state.

Lexington High School is now known for its musicians and music programs but, alas no band stand in the park. Bellville still uses theirs.

## "Prayed Parade" will celebrate National Day of Prayer on May 4

A parade leading to a worship service on the square Mansfield will highlight the National Day of Prayer in Mansfield, Thursday, May 4. The "Prayer Parade" will begin at 6:30 pm from the five-way light at Marion Avenue and Park Avenue West, following a festive hour of music, food and preparation.

The service, which will begin about 7 pm at the gazebo in Central Park will feature music and prayers for local and national leaders, First Responders and schools and families.

The parade is coordinated by Amanda Nichols, director of Project One and the ARC Empowerment Center, 378 Park Ave. West, culmination of a vision she first had nearly 20 years ago.

Congregations, church groups, Christian schools and local businesses have been invited to enter the parade.

Worship coordinator is Rev. El Akuchie, who with Ben Mutti has led the Richland Community Prayer Network for more than a quarter century. This is the first year the National Day of Prayer event has been in the evening.

"After a lively festival, we expect a time of fervent prayer, inviting all to join in at different times. This is an event for young and old, traditional and contemporary, for all Americans to lift up this time and place to the Lord," Akuchie says, adding. "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord.'

The National Day of Prayer has its roots in proclamations by Presidents Washington and Lincoln, and at various times by others presidents, but became an annual observance in 1952 when President Harry Truman responded during the Korean War.

# Ohio Education Association celebrates House-passed budget

In response to the Ohio House passing its version of the FY 2024–'25 state budget on Wednesday, Ohio Education Association (OEA) President Scott DiMauro issued the following statement:

"The Ohio Education Association applauds the Ohio House for prioritizing the students of our state in the budget bill passed in that chamber this week.

This budget includes significant investments in public schools — including a plan to increase the minimum teacher salary to address growing teacher shortage issues—and it promotes a number of sound public education policies, like repealing the punitive mandatory retention provision of the Third Grade Reading Guarantee while maintaining an emphasis on the importance of literacy for our children.

Additionally, this budget proposal makes school breakfast and lunch accessible to more children by having the state cover the difference in the cost between free and reduced-price meals.

More importantly, the House has demonstrated its commitment to working to fully and fairly fund the public schools that serve 90 percent of students in our state.

This budget measure increases state funding to public schools by nearly \$1 billion over the biennium by ensuring updated data is used in the Fair School Funding Plan (FSFP) formula to determine the actual costs of providing an excellent education to every child while continuing to provide more of the funding necessary to fulfill that promise, when the FSFP is fully implemented. OEA thanks the House for taking this important step forward.

The budget bill now moves to the Senate for consideration, and OEA urges our state Senators to build on the positive momentum of the House's work and pull back on the proposed expansion of voucher schemes that would amount to near universal eligibility in our state.

The Senate must do the right thing for Ohio's 1.6 million public school students, and OEA looks forward to working with lawmakers from both parties to ensure the best budget bill possible is adopted for the next biennium.

OEA would like to thank House Speaker Jason Stephens, Leader Allison Russo, House Finance Committee Chair Jay Edwards, and Ranking Member Bride Rose Sweeney for their bipartisan efforts to bring the budget to this point. The budget proposal they produced puts Ohio students first and shows that the House supports what Ohioans believe so strongly, that public education matters in our state."

Heller is available at the Richland County Dog Shelter in Mansfield. Those interested in meeting him or any other dog, can contact or visit the Richland County Dog Warden's Office and Shelter. Hours are 11 am to 4:15 pm Monday–Friday and 10 am to 2 pm on Saturday.

Currently, adoptions are on a schedule, based on the time the dog has been at the shelter. dogs that have been at the shelter for more than a year are \$50, dogs there more than six months are \$100, dogs at the shelter longer than three months are \$125, and dogs there less than three months are \$150. This fee includes spay/neuter, microchip, dog license, and some vaccines.

The shelter's current needs are volunteers to walk and play with the dogs as well as fill kongs for the dogs to play with when they are in their kennel, help with laundry or dishes, or clean the yard. The shelter uses a lot of bleach, laundry detergent, and dog treats and welcomes donations

This Day in History — A ceremony on May 4, 1905 marked the official beginning of the second attempt to build the Panama Canal. This second attempt to bridge the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans will succeed, dramatically altering world trade as well as the physical and geopolitical landscape of Central America. For decades before it was attempted, merchants and engineers fixated on the idea of creating a passage through Central America for ocean-going vessels, sparing them thousands of nautical miles and the dangerous trip around Cape Horn. Accidents, disease and the extremely hot conditions killed 5.609 workers over the decade it took to complete the canal. The United States remained the de facto sovereign of the canal and the Canal Zone until 1979 when, under President Jimmy Carter, the U.S. agreed to transfer management of the canal to Panama on Dec. 31, 1999.
