I am finally getting around to reviewing the movie *Plane*. This movie was released in January

and recently came out on blu ray and DVD.

Gerard Butler stars as an airline captain ready to fly from Singapore around the world to see his daughter in Hawaii on New Year's Eve. With a small group of passengers on board and a convict being transported (Mike Colter),

this should be an easy flight.

During the flight, the plane encounters a terrible storm and Butler has to land the plane in a secluded area that is, unbeknownst to them, not a place they want to be. The island has been taken over by criminals and smugglers. As the passengers get kidnapped, Butler and Colter's characters decide to work together to try and free them and get them home.

Plane feels very much like an 80s style action movie. The plane crash sequence is harrowing and there is a shootout near the end that is really well done and captivating. Butler does great work

here as the captain unsure about what to do and trying his best to bring these passengers home as

the FAA works behind the scenes trying to track down the plane and help in any way they can.

Butler has been a reliable go-to actor with these kinds of action style movies and he does some of his best work in this one. He and Colter have a good chemistry to-

gether and it's great the movie went for the R rating as it feels more authentic, and the stakes are higher with what the filmmakers can show.

Plane does not bring anything new to the table in terms of elevating the action genre, but it is good enough to enjoy for an evening at home if you are a fan of Butler's previous action films, Colter's stent on Marvel's Luke Cage and really engaging action movies that are pure entertainment.



Where the Railroad Tracks Ended

When the Sandusky, Mansfield & Newark Railroad was built it was primarily built to haul cargo north for shipment, and then east by water to markets. No eastward railroad existed over the mountains. And quite naturally, it carried passengers.

Most passengers wanted to go across the lake to Buffalo where they could travel by canal boats further east. Whether passengers wanted a voyage west, passing the great swamps to Lower Sandusky (Fremont) or Detroit, the best way to travel was by lake vessels.

The opening of Sandusky's two railroads brought even more ships to accommodate the freight and passenger business with several being owned or controlled by the rail lines. It wasn't unusual to see six to ten boats a day enter or leave the docks.

Lake travel wasn't without its hazards however. In 1823, the schooner "Sylph" left for Detroit and sank off North Bass Island with all aboard.

Three years later, the "Morning Star" went down off Middle Bass Island with a loss of two crewmen. The steamer "Chesapeake" and the schooner "Porter" collided in June 1847. Everyone on the "Porter" climbed aboard the "Chesapeake" figuring the schooner would sink. The "Chesapeake" headed for shore but her fires were soon flooded and both went down in forty feet of water. The upper cabin parted from the hull and to this, as well as doors and planks, survivors hung in rough waters. Seventy some were saved when the steamer "Harrison" came to their rescue.

The Feb. 23, 1947, edition of the *Buffalo Commercial Advertiser* contained a list of 55 brigs, schooners, propellers and steam boats being built on Lake Erie, amounting to 13,200 tons. Sandusky's boat yards were part of this total.

As traffic grew, so did the accident rate. The Jan. 12, 1850, edition of the *Daily Sanduskian* carried a list of shipwrecks on all the great lakes in 1849. There were 97 vessels which were involved in collisions, ran aground, capsized in storms, lost rigging, dumped cargo or were sunk during the year. Thirty-four lives were lost and damage to ships and cargo amounted to \$386,171, a huge sum in those days.

A major loss occurred in June of 1850 when the steamer "Griffith" caught fire 20 miles west of Cleveland on its way to Sandusky. It went down with nearly 300 lives lost. Of 154 bodies recovered the next day, 94 were buried in a common grave 40 feet long and 6 feet wide. Some of these were immigrants with no identification or family.

That same June the boiler on the "General Wayne" blew up near Vermillion with a loss of about 50. These hazards must have weighed heavily on the minds of railroad passengers arriving in Sandusky on the SM&N or later B&O, for transfer to ships. Rail travel must have looked safer.

Vote to increase constitutional amendments to 60% headed to ballot

State Representative Riordan McClain (R-Upper Sandusky) has voted in favor of an Ohio General Assembly joint resolution to place a constitutional amendment on the ballot, which would increase the percentage of statewide vote required to make any future Ohio constitutional changes.

Senate Joint Resolution 2 calls for an Aug. 8 statewide election to decide if the following measures should be adopted to protect our constitution from policy change efforts:

- •Increase the passage threshold from 50% plus one vote to 60% of statewide voters for constitutional amendments
 - •Include all 88 counties for petition signatures.
 - •Eliminate signature cure "do-over" period.

McClain had the following regarding SJR2: "This important decision deserves Ohioans' vote. I have supported the constitution protection amendment my entire tenure in the legislature. I supported putting it on the ballot five years ago, last November, this May and now I again support giving Ohio voters the choice at the ballot in August. Our state constitution is a founding document, not a place where policy battles are fought. The Ohio Constitution has been amended a startling 172 times, in comparison the U.S. Constitution has been amended only 27 times in 234 years. I urge all Ohioans to make plans to vote in this August 8 special election.

State Representative Riordan McClain is currently serving his third term in the Ohio House of Representatives.
