Miss Ohio Stephanie Finoti working to break barriers in STEM and beyond

Stephanie Finoti, Miss Ohio 2024, is a ballerina, scientist, first-generation American and college graduate. Finishing fourth runner-up at Miss America 2024, Finoti visited Ontario Middle School to inspire girls in STEM last week.

Finoti encouraged the middle school girls to pursue science, technology, engineering, arts, and math (STEAM) without feeling limited. Her message, "If you can't see her, you can create her," truly resonated with the students. Ontario's STEM program, currently 80% male, aims to increase female participation through hands-on training and career pathways.

STEM and CAD instructor, Heath Sager, is excited that Ontario Career Tech students have the opportunity to have real-world resources and hands-on training that will prepare them for future careers.

"The students deserve it and all of the resources that Mr. Strickler and the Board are bringing here are just outstanding! It gives them a sense of direction about what their future could hold and that's really neat!"

Finoti was super impressed with what Ontario High School is offering their students. "These resources are just incredible! I'm blown away by the machinery that is available to these students. When I was in high school, I didn't even have a proper lab, so you guys are ten steps ahead and that's incredible!"

Growing up in a marginalized community without resources or mentorship, Finoti

created That STEM Girl to empower over 20,000 girls in STEM and medicine. She stresses that medicine isn't limited to becoming a doctor or nurse — fields like coding, robotics, and biomedical research offer countless opportunities.

"The energy in the room was electric," Finoti said after teaching girls in grades 5–8 about STEM. She also had the opportunity to tour the school's state-of-the-art STEM lab, praising the opportunities available to students and encouraging more girls to get involved.

Finoti shared her story of having to choose between choir and advanced geometry in middle school — a decision that inspired her to blend creativity and science. After a dance injury sparked her interest in anatomy and medicine, she realized that STEM and the arts are deeply connected.

"Who knew I could dance, be a scientist, and appear on the Miss America stage?" Finoti said. She emphasized that young women shouldn't have to pick between creativity and logic — they can succeed in both.

"When we separate students from their creative and logical sides of their brain, and don't allow them to work together, we really limit them from all the possibilities that they have. With balance, determination, and confidence, these women can succeed in all aspects of their life without shedding pieces of themselves to fit in," she said.

Finoti highlighted the need for more women in STEM, especially in medicine,



Jack Quaid stars as an average, everyday assistant manager of a bank named Nathan in *Novocaine*. Nathan has one secret though, he has a condition where he can't feel pain. When his bank his robbed, a young teller he has taken an interest in gets kidnapped and he takes it upon himself to find her.

Quaid (the son of actors Dennis Quaid and Meg Ryan) is great in this movie as his performance requires him to do some pretty elaborate stunt work (including one in a restaurant kitchen) though also be charming and funny too.

Nathan gets himself in some pretty outrageous situations though since he cannot feel pain the results can be pretty enter-

taining. A sequence in a booby trapped house is especially well done. The movie does overdo the violence a little as the ending fight is a bit much though does not ruin the movie.

Voter registration deadline for primary election is April 7

The deadline to register to vote or change an address or name for the May 6, primary/special election is Monday, April 7.

The Richland County Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm. This office is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave. Suite 101 in the Longview Center.

After 4 pm, those coming to vote must use the entrance at the lower-level back parking area at the southwest corner of the building.

- Qualifications for registering to vote include:
- must be either a native U. S. citizen or a naturalized U.S citizen
 - must be a resident of Richland County and Ohio 30 days before an election
 - must be a minimum of 18 years of age on or before the date of the general election on Nov. 4, 2025.

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person.

Voters currently registered in Ohio may change their address online at VoteOhio.gov but must do so by the April 7 deadline. Online registration is also now available at VoteOhio.gov.

In addition to the Richland County Board of Elections office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at the following locations in Richland County:

- Any library branch
- All city and village hall offices
- The Bureau of Motor Vehicles office
- The Department of Human Services
- The Richland County Courthouse (recorder or treasurer offices)
- All area high school offices

Registration forms may also be obtained from the Board of Elections website at vote.richlandcountyooh.gov or requested by mail.

To have a form sent by mail, contact the board office at 419-774-5530. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days before election day.

Construction projects are anticipated to affect ODOT roadways in Richland County. All outlined work is weather permitting and is subject to change.

SR 13 northbound and southbound, from Hanley Road to Chilton Avenue, will have daily single lane closures for a resurfacing project. Traffic will be maintained with barrels in 11' lanes. Estimated completion for the 2025 construction season is November 2025. Estimated completion of the entire project is May 2027.

I-71 northbound and southbound, between SR 39 and U.S. 30, will have single lane closures for a slope stabilization project. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained. Estimated completion is November 2025.

Donations needed for Dolly Parton Imagination Library

Richland Public Health (RPH) is in need of help to keep the Dolly Parton Imagination Library running in Richland County.

Over the past year, this program has provided over 4,100 Richland County children between the ages of birth to five years a free book in the mail every single month.

It costs \$130,000 a year to keep this program operational and enrollment in the program continues to increase.

The State of Ohio helps pay for half of the total amount (state contribution, \$65,000), which leaves Richland County with the responsibility to pay for the remaining \$65,000.

RPH is contributing \$15,000, Altrusa has pledged \$5,000 and OhioHealth has pledged \$2,600 for April 2025–March 2026. Help is needed to cover the remaining \$42,400.

Any contribution can help provide books to local children.

LOBSTER RISOTTO

Ingredients

- 2-3 cups of cooked lobster meat
- 1 lb risotto, arborio rice
- 2 cups seafood stock
- 32 ounces chicken broth
- 2 Tbsp. basil, chopped
- 2 Tbsp. tarragon, chopped
- 2 shallots, chopped
- 1/2 cup parmesan cheese
- 4 Tbsp. butter
- 4 Tbsp. olive oil
- Salt & pepper

Instructions

In a stockpot, heat the seafood stock and chicken broth together. On a large saute pan over medium heat, combine the butter and olive oil. When the butter has melted, add chopped shallots and saute 2-3 minutes, until shallot is translucent. Add rice and stir to coat well. Continue to stir rice until it is beginning to have a nutty aroma, but does not turn brown. Add a ladle of hot stock to the rice and continue to stir. When the rice is almost dry, continue to add another 1 tbs. hot stock. This will take 20-30 minutes. (You do want to make sure you wait until liquid is complete absorbed before adding additional liquid.) You will know that the rice is done when it is just al dente to the teeth when you try it. (This means just a bit sticky). You don't want to add any more liquid or you will begin to get mushy rice. Gently stir in the lobster meat, basil and tarragon. Taste and add salt and pepper. Stir in most of cheese (reserving some to garnish on top of risotto when you serve it).

NOTE: Seafood Stock - We boiled the lobster shells and discard what we had when we shelled the lobster. (Boil for 1-2 hours). This will make a perfect stock to use in the risotto. If you don't have time or don't want to do this, you can just substitute chicken stock or 1 cup of white wine

MWCD celebrates 15 Years of its Partners in Watershed Management grants program

This year, the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District (MWCD) is celebrating the 15th anniversary of its Partners in Watershed Management (PWM) grants program by awarding \$1,305,707 in new grants to 11 projects that will support flood mitigation and water quality improvement and conservation across Eastern Ohio.

“Eastern Ohio is blessed with talented, committed professionals and organizations that share a common mission: preserving and managing the Muskingum River watershed to protect life, property and our natural resources. For 15 years, MWCD has shared its resources with dozens of these organizations to invest over \$10 million in strategic efforts to both reduce flooding and drive conservation,” said MWCD Executive Director Craig Butler.

Since its inception in 2009, PWM has provided over \$10.7 million in grant funding for 156 projects in 18 counties across the Muskingum River watershed, the largest watershed contained entirely within Ohio and a watershed covering almost a third of the state. The program is highly competitive with a multi-step review process to ensure that highly effective projects receive grant dollars. All applications are reviewed by MWCD staff and a select group of volunteer industry experts prior to the Chief Engineer and Chief of Conservation recommending applications for approval to the Executive Director and the Board of Directors.

“We have received three impactful PWM Grants over the last several years and are so grateful for the partnership with MWCD,” said Lisa Crock, district administrator, Muskingum Soil and Water Conservation District. “The first funded our Aquatic Education Trailer, teaching water quality through a visual contrast of healthy and polluted streams. Since 2011, hundreds of students have benefited. The second grant supported water testing in farm tile drainage, leading some farmers to reduce fertilizer use without impacting yield. The latest grant funds our ‘Grow Native’ project, providing a small no-till drill to help landowners establish pollinator habitats.”

Local projects for 2025 include Ashland County Park District, Ashland, Greentown Native American Preserve, to acquire 58.4 acres of Black Fork riverbank habitat to protect native wildlife, high-quality meadow, forest, wetland areas and historic Native American sites, \$194,000; and West Creek Conservancy, Richland County, Clear Fork Mohican River Wetland Restoration Project, to restore 62-acre property with riverfront forest and wetlands to mitigate downstream flooding and protect water quality in the Clear Fork Mohican River, \$35,500.

Organizations interested in future rounds of funding are encouraged to contact MWCD to discuss projects at least 30 days prior to the application deadline of Sept. 1, 2025, to learn more about the application process and have applications preliminarily screened for eligibility. 

Richland County Board of Elections announces ballot issues for primary

The May 6 election is a primary/special election. The whole county will be voting as State Issue 2 is on the ballot. As with all primaries, candidates declare a party and run on that party's ballot.

Winners in the primary election are then nominated to be the candidate in the November general election.

With this being an odd-year election, local offices are on the ballot. Only the cities of Mansfield and Ontario have partisan primaries. Ohio Revised Code allows uncontested candidates to be nominated directly to the November election without being voted on in the primary. Party ballots will be available for:

Mansfield Ward 1: A democrat, republican, and issues-only ballot will be available. The rest of the City of Mansfield will only have an issues-only ballot available. (The other candidates that filed were unopposed and nominated to the November ballot)

City Of Ontario: A republican and issues-only ballot is available. (The democrat candidates that filed were unopposed and nominated to the November ballot).

The rest of Richland County will only have an issues-only ballot available. In addition to the state issue, the following subdivisions have issues on the ballot:

AARP Ohio commends bill sponsored by U.S. Representative Mike Carey

AARP Ohio commends the reintroduction of the Credit for Caring Act, legislation that would provide financial relief to eligible working family caregivers in Ohio and throughout the nation.

Sponsored by U.S. Representative Mike Carey (R-OH-15), the Credit for Caring Act offers up to a \$5,000 nonrefundable federal tax credit to help offset family caregiving-related expenses, such as home care aides, adult day services, home modifications, and respite care.

"We know that families want to support their loved ones through illness, disability and aging in place. The Credit for Caring Act offers relief to caregivers, allowing them to prioritize their loved ones and worry less about the effects on their family budget," Rep. Carey said. "This tax credit would offset costs American families have to bear to care for their loved ones and provides flexibility to care for them in the way that works best for their family's situation. I hope my colleagues join me in the effort to pass it."

Family caregivers spend on average more than \$7,200 annually — 26% of their income — on out-of-pocket expenses.

"This crucial legislation offers much-needed financial relief for the invaluable contributions of family caregivers, who often sacrifice their own financial stability to care for loved ones, while juggling work and caregiving responsibilities," said AARP State Director Jenny Carlson, a family caregiver herself.

"This act also represents a significant step towards supporting our aging population and ensuring that families can continue to provide high-quality care at home. It also benefits employers by reducing the financial strain on employees who balance work and caregiving responsibilities, leading to a more productive and engaged workforce.

We urge Congress to pass this vital legislation, which will have a profound impact on the well-being of families, the economy, and the overall health of our communities," said Carlson.

Ohio's family caregivers provide 1.4 billion hours of care and up to \$21 billion in unpaid labor per year caring for aging parents, spouses, and others in need so that they can remain in their homes and communities. Nearly one in four of these family caregivers are millennials (currently age 28 to 43) and 40% of them are men.

This often comes at a steep personal cost, however. Sixty-one percent of family caregivers nationwide work either full- or part-time, with many having to cut back on work or even leave their jobs, sacrificing income, retirement savings, and financial security. An AARP analysis estimates that if caregivers aged 50 and older received better workplace support, the U.S. GDP could grow by an additional \$1.7 trillion in 2030.

"Family caregivers play an essential role in supporting their loved ones, yet they often face steep personal and financial challenges. We thank Congressman Carey for sponsoring this important legislation, and we urge Congress to pass this legislation to ease the challenge on family caregivers and help them continue their vital work" Carlson said.

Alzheimer's Association offers free resources to help families

During tax season, the Alzheimer's Association is encouraging individuals and families to make financial plans that will create some security in preparing for an unexpected crisis of caring for someone with Alzheimer's or other dementia.

One in nine Americans the age of 65 and older are living with Alzheimer's disease — that's nearly seven million Americans across the country and 236,200 in Ohio.

"Tax season is an ideal time to think about how to pay for future Alzheimer's and dementia care," said Pam Myers, senior director, programs for the Alzheimer's Association Northwest Ohio and Central Ohio Chapters.

"Putting financial plans in place can help families secure their financial future, helping to avoid financial problems, especially those caregivers who have to reduce their work hours or take time off."

Dementia not only takes a tremendous physical toll on diagnosed individuals, but the costs associated with the disease can be overwhelming and put a huge economical strain on families. Disease-related costs can jeopardize a family's financial security, and many families and caregivers make enormous personal and financial sacrifices.

According to the Alzheimer's Association:

- The lifetime cost of Alzheimer's and dementia to our nation in 2024 was \$360 billion. By 2050, these costs are projected to reach \$1 trillion.

- In 2022, the lifetime cost of care for a person living with dementia was \$392,874.

- On average, Medicare beneficiaries who are 65 and older with

Alzheimer's or another dementia paid \$10,289 out of pocket annually for health care and long-term care services not covered by other sources.

- Nearly half (48 percent) of caregivers must cut back on their own expenses — including necessities like food, transportation and medical care — to afford dementia-related care, while others must draw from their own savings or retirement funds.

- Nearly two out of three people incorrectly believe that Medicare helps pay for nursing home care or are unsure whether it does.

To help families navigate these and other financial challenges, the Alzheimer's Association Northwest Ohio Chapter offers a free online education program, "Managing Money: A Caregiver's Guide to Finances."

Tips from the program include:

- Plan early — There are many benefits of planning early when it comes to your finances — both for the caregiver and the person with the disease.

- Start a positive discussion about finances — Bring in trusted family members or close friends for a discussion about what the person with the disease wants for the future.

- Avoid financial abuse and fraud — Individuals living with dementia have a greater risk of becoming victims and may struggle with making good financial decisions.

- Organize your finances — Conduct an inventory of your financial resources (such as savings, insurance, retirement benefits, government aid, VA benefits). A financial planner or an elder care attorney can help.

- Create a backup plan — Designate a trusted back-up agent for the person's power of attorney and consider designating responsibilities to more than one person.

There are 236,200 Ohioans 65 and older living with Alzheimer's disease according to the Alzheimer's Association 2024 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures. A total of 414,000 Ohio caregivers provide 624 million hours of unpaid care each year, valued at \$11.4 billion.
