Local lake monitors needed

Volunteers with Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD) take an active role in water quality.

The next lake monitor volunteer training will be held Tuesday, April 29, from 5–7 pm at Pleasant Hill Lake, 3431 OH-95 Perrysville.

Richland SWCD partners with the Ohio Lake Management Society-Citizen Lake Awareness and Monitoring (OLMS-CLAM) for training and equipment.

Volunteers will learn how to record water clarity, color, temperature and depth and will monitor Clear Fork, Charles Mill and Pleasant Hill Lakes.

The data is used to document changes in lake conditions and the information is used to assist with watershed management efforts. Results are shared with the public and help increase awareness about water quality and conservation.

Volunteers add data onto the Richland Soil and Water Conservation District website in real-time so must have access to the internet. To join this citizen-scientist group, sign up to attend the training at

Those attending the training are reminded to wear weather appropriate clothing and footwear.

RCCS hosts Child Abuse Prevention Month kick-off at Malabar Intermediate

To kick-off Child Abuse Prevention Month, Richland County Children Services (RCCS) partnered with Malabar Intermediate School for a rally on Tuesday, April 1.

for a rally on Tuesday, April 1. This year's theme, "Doing Things Differently: Believing in Communities," resonated throughout the event, celebrating the resilience of families and the ongoing work dedicated to protecting children and uniting families across Richland County.

The rally featured proclamations from notable figures including Tammy Puff, Director of Military and Veteran Relations for the Office of Governor Mike DeWine and Mansfield City Mayor Jodie Perry, both of whom recognized April as Child Abuse Prevention Month. Richland County Commissioners Cliff Mears, Tony Vero and Darrell Banks also joined the festivities, demonstrating a unified commitment to child welfare.

Community members heard from speakers including Tara Lautzenhiser, Richland County Children Services (RCCS) Executive Director;

Tom Hager, Malabar Intermediate School Principal; Cristen Gilbert, Mansfield Branch-YM-CA of North Central Ohio Executive Director; Raykayla Smith, Miss Black Ohio America Teen 2024; and Sean Trourten, a sixth-grade student at Malabar Intermediate.

Pastor Aaron Williams Jr. of Maddox Memorial Church of God in Christ also shared heartfelt messages, emphasizing the collective effort needed to uplift families within our community.

The highlight of the event was the keynote address delivered by Teana Sykes, a renowned author, speaker, coach

and creator of "Tea Talk", who urged students to believe in their potential and support one another. "When children thrive, communities thrive," Sykes proclaimed, leaving an indelible mark on the hearts of those in attendance.





A Book Review By Mandy Belczak Gurney




I always trust in getting a good and surprising story with Fiona Davis. She writes NYC historical fiction. There is always a double plot line that converges.

Orders being accepted for pond fish

The Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD) has announced orders are being accepted for the pond fish sale until April 17.

Customers can select from bluegill, \$1.25 each; yellow perch, \$1.25 each; largemouth bass, \$1.50 each; fathead minnows, \$8.25 per 100; channell catfish, \$1.25 each; hybrid bluegill, \$1.25 each; redear bluegill, \$1.25 each; and white amur, \$16 each.

In addition to fish, customers may also purchase essential pond supplies including Pond conditioner, prices vary; optimal fish food, \$48; and plastic bag and tie, \$1 each.

Orders may be placed online at https://richlandswcd.net/ event/pond-fish-sale-order-deadline-2/. A minimum order of \$20 is required.

Pick-up for all orders will take place at the Richland County Fairgrounds Horse Barn on April 25 from 10 to 11:30 am. Customers should bring appropriate containers to transport their fish safely. Five-gallon buckets work well but must have an unscented poly liner to ensure fish have enough oxygen during transportation. Customers should also have their containers filled onethird full with the pond water the fish will be transferred into.

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Richland County Juvenile Court's CASA raising awareness in April

Richland County Juvenile Court's CASA Program is raising awareness about the fight to keep local children safe from harm during Child Abuse Prevention Month this April.

Child Abuse Prevention Month highlights the importance of families and communities working together to fight child abuse and neglect.

This push is central to the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) program mission of having highly trained community members advocate in court for children experiencing abuse and neglect.

After undergoing a background check and comprehensive training, CASA volunteers are appointed by Juvenile Court Judge Steve McKinley to advocate for children in abuse or neglect cases. Volunteers are community members from all walks of life.

According to Judge McKinley, "advocacy by a CASA volunteer is crucial to helping the court ensure that youth are integrated into loving, permanent homes. Being a CASA volunteer is a great way to serve youth who have been troubled by a broken family structure."

CASA Program Director Brooke Henwood praised local volunteers for their continued investment in learning the circumstances of children's lives in order to ensure that, through their advocacy, each child's voice is heard by the court.

CASA volunteers in Richland County advocated for the best interest of 328 local children in 2024.

Retired Juvenile Judge Ron Spon founded the Court's CASA Program in 1998 to serve the unique needs of abuse and neglected children in our community; an initiative which is continued today by as many as 70 community volunteers.

Volunteers complete at least 30 hours of training and in-court observation before being assigned a case. CASA volunteers receive continued support in their advocacy work and complete annual training.

Richland County CASA is part of a state and national network. There are 48 CASA programs serving more than 9,000 children in 62 Ohio counties annually.

There is a need for more community members to become CASA volunteers and protect children. Training of new CASA volunteers is available at no cost each spring and fall. To learn more contact Brooke Henwood at bhenwood@rcjcoh.us or 419-774-5802.

State Representatives Riordan McClain (R-Upper Sandusky) and Melanie Miller (R-City of Ashland) recently introduced legislation to recognize and promote the great work midwives perform around the state.

The bill creates new licensure framework for midwives in Ohio, expanding access to midwifery services and providing additional levels of care for Ohio women. McClain and Miller also championed this policy during the previous General Assembly.

The bill aims to recognize and provide new, optional licensure framework for midwives; ensure that traditional (lay) midwives can continue to operate without licensure as they always have as long as they receive informed consent from their clients and carry out their limited scope of work; create an advisory committee to oversee and advise on matters regarding midwifery; and designate May 5 as "Day of the Midwife."

"The miracle of birth is an awe-inspiring event and isn't simply a procedure to be rushed as long as mom and baby are doing well," said McClain. "Midwives provide a time-tested approach to prenatal care and childbirth that guides the mother through the natural processes to bringing a healthy baby from their womb into their arms."

"I believe this legislation will benefit existing midwives, encourage others to become midwives, and reduce the number of maternity health deserts in Ohio," said Miller. "If a woman wants a midwife for pregnancy, there are many types she can choose from that will give her different levels of care."

McClain and Miller cited the issues surrounding access to maternity services, especially in rural areas, as a key driver behind the bill.

The legislation awaits a bill number and House committee assignment.

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Construction projects announced

Construction projects are anticipated to affect ODOT roadways in Richland County. All work is weather permitting. State Route 13 northbound and southbound, from Hanley Road

State Route 13 northbound and southbound, from Hanley Road to Chilton Avenue, will have long-term lane closures for a resurfacing project. The northbound and southbound driving lanes will be closed for roadway reconstruction and culvert work. Traffic will be maintained in 10' lanes in each direction with barrels. Estimated completion for the 2025 construction season is November 2025. Estimated completion of entire project is May 2027.

Interstate 71 northbound and southbound, between SR 39 and U.S. 30, will have single lane closures for a slope stabilization project. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained. Estimated completion is November 2025.

State Route 181 SR 181 will have single lane closures from just south of Main Street in Crestline, to SR 309. Project work includes pavement repairs and bridge maintenance work. Traffic will be maintained by flaggers. Estimated completion is September 2025.

State Route 181, between Ulmer Road and Horning Road, will close Monday, April 14 for a culvert replacement.

The detour route for eastbound motorists will be SR 181 east to SR 61 south to SR 309 east to SR 181 and reverse for westbound motorists. Estimated completion is Friday, April 18,. State Route 314 from the Morrow County line to the city of Ontar-

State Route 314 from the Morrow County line to the city of Ontario corporation limits will have single lane closures for a pavement repair project. Traffic will be maintained by flaggers. Estimated completion is June 2025.

Artist Laureate to present original film documenting effects of PTSD

The Artist Laureate for The Ohio State University will visit Ohio State Mansfield for an April 21 screening of *Scrap Heap*, a film he wrote, starred in and produced on the effects of post-traumatic stress disorder in military veterans.

Kevin McClatchy is the head of Acting and Directing in Ohio State's Department of Theatre, Film, and Media Arts. He is also the director of the OSU Shakespeare & Veterans Initiative and the OSU Shakespeare and Autism Project.

Based on a true story, "Scrap Heap" is a turbulent, darkly funny whiplash tour that examines the costs of war and explores the reality of what we ask of service members as well as society's responsibility in the transition from service to civilian life.

The idea for "Scrap Heap" came from McClatchy's reflection on the people in his life impacted by military service. He recalled how his father, a Marine in World War II, lived the last 60 years of his life with undiagnosed PTSD, and how it would have been invaluable to

have understood those experiences growing up. He also learned about his friend, Jeff's, remarkable military service and struggles with the VA, mental health.

"Creating this film has helped me widen my radar of how our veterans are portrayed and given me a frontrow seat into a portion of their experience," he said. "People

who have seen this film, including veterans, tell me that it helps express and amplify their struggles in ways they could not do alone."

Please note, *Scrap Heap* discusses combat-related trauma

and suicide and uses flashing lights and sound effects including gunfire.

The film will be shown at 6 p.m., inside the auditorium at Riedl Hall. The event is free to attend and there is no pre-registration.

Following the showing of the film, a community conversation will be held to discuss reactions and

perceptions regarding the military-civilian divide in the Unit-





The Warriors apparently love the number 3 thus far. They currently have three wins. In their opening game on March 31, they handed the Madison Rams a loss, 6–3.


In the next two games, on April 1 and 2, they handed River Valley two losses by the scores of 5–2 and 11–8. Again, a margin of victory three runs.

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National nonprofit credit counseling agency helps consumers cut through the confusion of balance transfers

When faced with mounting credit card debt, a balance transfer promotion that offers promising low or zero interest may seem like a lifeline. Before committing to a transfer, factor in these fees and compare them to potential savings to determine if the move is financially beneficial.
