### **Richland County Foundation** grants over \$8.7M in 2024

During the Richland County Foundation (RCF) annual meeting, RCF President & CEO Allie Watson reported the foundation granted \$8,771,101 in 2024. Donors continued to be very generous and gifts for the year totaled \$8,721,037.

Foundation donors were most passionate about supporting community development with grants totaling \$2,640,595. Other sectors receiving grants were children/families/youth \$1,618,939, education \$1,599,678, arts & culture \$1,411,118, human services \$877,956, health services \$196,736, environment \$191,436, economic development \$153,537, and churches \$81,106. Guest speaker Chair of the Women's Fund, Amy Hiner discussed their focus on childcare. She said the Women's Fund has invested in childcare since 2019. Access to affordable, high-quality childcare is an economic issue for women and lays the foundation for successful educational outcomes in children ages birth to five. When women and families thrive, our community is strong, and our future is bright. The Women's Fund is seeking companies and organizations to partner with us to fund this effort.





The Agency on Aging Board of Trustees elected to provide a total of \$4000 in scholarship awards this year to individuals who will benefit the field of aging.



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2000's *Final Destination* set off one of the most fun and rewatchable horror movie franchises.

Devon Sawa headed a cast where everyone must try to cheat death while knowing it's coming. The second entry made an entire generation switch lanes when there is a log truck in front of them.

The third entry was interesting in terms of

how it used photographs to tell the story. This latest installment, the sixth, is titled *Final Destination: Bloodlines.* This is a great entry because it forces a family to work together as they all try to cheat death.

A young woman survives while escaping a collapsing tower in the 1950s, based on a premonition she has. Fast forwarding to present day, Stefani (Kaitlyn Santa Juanta) keeps having recurring dreams based on her grandmother. She discovers that death is coming for her entire family, and she must try to protect all of them, and herself.

The use of a family is such an interesting approach to this franchise as most entries have followed the same pattern.



Juanta is very good in the lead role as she and her family mem-

bers all take center stage because the writers give some nice character development not usually seen in this series.

The most entertaining character is her cousin Erik (Richard Harmon) who owns a tattoo and piercing shop and provides some genuine laughs that make this movie really shine.

The deaths are what audiences come for and there is certainly no shortage of memorable ones. The entire opening sequence is very effective and suspenseful. A couple more that stand out include deaths that involve a backyard barbecue and an MRI machine.

*Final Destination: Bloodlines* works so well bringing this long dormant franchise back to life. With a great lead performance, memorable deaths, funny moments and a nice spin on the usual plotline, this entry is absolutely worth seeing in the theater and is a top tier movie in the franchise.

# HEAP application deadline nearing

The Ohio Department of Development and the Area Agency on Aging want to remind older Ohioans that assistance is available to help with home energy bills.

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) helps Ohioans at or below 175% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for a household of up to seven members and 60% of state median income for a household of eight or more members to pay their heating bills.

Applied directly to a utility or bulk fuel bill, the benefit can help manage heating costs. Older Ohioans may go to their local Area Agency on Aging office for help with assembling the required documents and completing an application. Visit www.energyhelp.ohio.gov to apply online or to download an application.

When applying, individuals need to have copies of most recent utility bills, a list of all household members (birth dates and Social Security numbers), proof of income for the past 30 days for all household members (12 months for certain income types), proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members. and proof of disability (if applicable). HEAP benefits are applied to

HEAP benefits are applied to an energy bill after Jan. 1, 2025. Applications must be received by May 31. For information or assistance with applying call 419-524-4144 and ask for a navigator.

# Ontario Library's remodel to be celebrated at grand reopening

The Mansfield/Richland County Public Library (MRCPL) invites the community to the grand reopening and ribbon-cutting ceremony of the newly renovated Ontario Branch on Thursday, May 22, at 10 am, at 2221 Village Mall Dr., Ontario. (This is a change in the initially posted May 19 date.)

After a 13-month renovation project, the Ontario Branch is reopening with a fresh look and enhanced features. The \$2.2 million project was completed under budget, with design by HBM Architects and construction managed by Simonson Construction Services.

The branch, which closed on April 21, 2024, underwent a complete interior transformation, with several exterior updates as well. One of the most noticeable upgrades is the relocated main entrance, now conveniently situated adjacent to the parking lot.

Other key improvements include, vibrant, comfortable new furnishings throughout the building; a dedicated, enclosed space for teens; flexible programming areas, a modernized community room, and additional meeting rooms; enhanced lighting across the facility; improved accessibility features; and 24/7 locker pick-up access (not immediately available upon opening).

"The reopening of the Ontario Branch is a significant milestone in MRCPL's commitment to serving as a true community hub that enriches the quality of life for all Richland County residents," said Chris May, Library Director. "These renovations go beyond aesthetics, they offer increased functionality, greater efficiency and reduced operating costs."

Following the grand opening, the Ontario Branch will resume regular operating hours: Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, 9 am to 8 pm; Wednesday, Friday, Saturday, 9 am to 5 pm; and Sunday, 1–5 pm

### **OSU-Mansfield electronic camp** registration deadline is Friday

High school students entering grades 9–12 for the 2025–'26 academic year can participate in two free electronics camps being held at The Ohio State University at Mansfield in August.

Both camps are offered in collaboration with the Richland Area Chamber & Economic Development and the 179th Cyberspace Wing.

"Electronics for Beginners" will take place Aug. 4–7. Students will engage in hands-on learning, exploring the basics of programming in a variant of the C + + language and working with Arduino kits to design interactive systems.

The kits will be provided, but students must bring their own laptop with Windows.

"Electronics for Intermediate Users" will be held Aug. 11–14. This hands-on course will push students to integrate sensors, motors and displays while expanding their coding and problem-solving abilities. This camp is tailored for students who have some prior coding experience and are looking to deepen their knowledge.

"This is an exceptional opportunity for high school students this summer," said Cynthia Callahan, associate professor of English at Ohio State Mansfield.

"Students will engage in experiential learning led by experienced computer science professionals."

These camps help students interested in technology develop skills and understand educational and career pathways, said Mansfield-Richland Area Educational Foundation Director Angie Cirone.

"It's impressive to see the projects the students create over four days," Cirone said.

round at Wynford against the Royals last week, 10-0.





### **Richland SWCD accepting cover crop cost share applications**

Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD) has announced the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District (MWCD) Cover Crop Cost Share program is accepting applications until June 20. The goal of the program is to encourage landowners and farmers to plant cover crops to reduce soil erosion, improve soil health, and to increase crop productivity, and farm profitability. Producers who plant cover crops and are accepted in the program will receive a cost share amount of \$12 per acre.

In 2024 the MWCD cover crop cost share program assisted in getting cover crops planted on 380 acres of Richland County farmland.

There is a 175-acre cap which applies across multiple counties if the landowner is signing up in multiple counties.

Enrollment is open for those landowners and farmers within the assessment zone. However, any cover crop planted in the watershed of Charles Mill or Pleasant Hill Lakes automatically qualifies for funding with no cap on the acres funded.

This program cannot be enrolled with another program to receive funding for the same cover crop such as EQIP (Environmental Quality Incentives Program) and Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP). There are no exceptions to the United States Department of Agriculture-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) seeding dates and rates.

Cancer advocates gather at statehouse Cancer patients, survivors, caregivers and advocates from across the Buckeye State gathered at the Statehouse to meet their elected officials with during the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network's Cancer Action Day on April 29.

They let lawmakers know that Ohio can and must do better to reduce the burden of cancer by reducing the incidence of the disease and improving access to care. Advocates met with lawmak-

ers to ask them to support increasing the state's cigarette tax by \$1.50 per pack, with a parallel tax on all other tobacco products, and allocating \$10 million annually to programs that prevent kids from starting to use tobacco and help those already addicted quit.

Ohio has some of the highest tobacco use rates in the country and it is past time for lawmakers to take meaningful action.

"I lost my mom to lung cancer because of tobacco use, and now I'm fighting breast cancer myself. That's why my participation in Cancer Action Day, urging our lawmakers to take action to reduce tobacco use and improve access to care, is so important to me," Jill McFarland, Ohio cancer patient. "Far too many families have already suffered enough. It is past time for Ohio to take meaningful action to reduce the burden of cancer."

Advocates also met with lawmakers to ask them to support House Bill 8, which will improve access to biomarker testing. This legislation will help address a significant barrier and bring the promise of precision medicine to more Ohioans, no matter their income or where they live. Biomarker testing opens the door to targeted therapies, which can benefit patients by leading to better outcomes, improved quality of life, and, in some cases, reduced costs from bypassing ineffective therapies.

Lastly, advocates asked lawmakers to support prostate cancer screening legislation, House Bill 33. This legislation will ensure that more men in Ohio over 40 who are at high risk of developing cancer will have access to the prostate cancer screening they need. This bill also removes cost barriers such as copays or other out-of-pocket expense requirements for these screenings.

An estimated 77,010 Ohioans will be diagnosed with cancer, and 24,440 are expected to die from the devastating disease this year. Those gathered at the Statehouse today are calling on Ohio lawmakers to change this by taking steps to prioritize the fight against cancer.

#### Postal customers asked to maintain mailboxes

With National Mailbox Improvement Week (May 18-24), the U.S. Postal Service is encouraging customers to inspect, maintain, and upgrade their mailboxes to help ensure safe, secure, and efficient mail delivery.

'Customer's mailboxes are the first point of contact for receiving birthday cards, letters, and important documents," said Act-ing Postmaster and CEO Doug Tulino. "A well-maintained mailbox helps to ensure that every package and parcel makes it to its intended destination safely and efficiently.

Each year, USPS designates the third week of May as Mailbox Improvement Week to encourage customers with box-onpost-delivery to examine and, where necessary, improve the appearance of their mailboxes. Through regular mailbox maintenance efficient mail delivery, enhanced neighborhood curb appeal, and improved postal service operations are better ensured.

The Postal Service annually calls attention to Mailbox Awareness Week because of the wear and tear that occurs to mailboxes throughout the year. Some of the typical activities homeowners may need to do include replacing loose hinges on a mailbox door, repainting a mailbox that may have rusted or has started to peel, remounting a loosened mailbox post, replacing or adding house numbers and keeping security top-of-mind.

USPS partners with the U.S. Postal Inspection Service to keep postal employees, the mail stream, and the American public safe, prevent incidents through education and awareness, and enforce the laws that protect our nation's mail network.

Tips to secure your mail include:

•Promptly pick up your mail: Try not to leave letters and packages in your mailbox or at your door for any length of time.

•Report mailbox vandalism: If you see someone actively tampering with a mailbox, immediately report it to the police.

If you know of someone who committed an act of mailbox vandalism, report it to Postal Inspectors at 1-877-876-2455.

A newer feature of the USPS is Informed Delivery. Customers can see photos of their mail before it arrives and receive notifications when it's delivered. Customers can also get Daily Digest emails that preview their mail and packages scheduled to arrive soon. The free service also allows customers to track and manage their packages in one convenient place.
