MCS expands career preparation with new business academy

Mansfield Christian School (MCS) is expanding its investment in students and the local community through the launch of a new business academy, the addition of classroom space, and continued progress toward a new high school campus.

The school recently launched the Academy of Business through the Mansfield Christian Career Academy Program, also known as MCCAP. This new academy will help students explore business careers while developing practical skills, connecting with local leaders, and building a better understanding of how their abilities can be used to serve others and honor Christ.

The Academy of Business joins MCS's existing career academy programs in health professions, STEM, and ministry and missions. All four academies were designed to prepare students for life after graduation and respond to the needs of the local job market by helping students develop the skills that employers value most.

MCS recently added a fourth modular classroom unit to provide additional space for students and staff. At the same time, the school continues to move forward with a capital campaign that will sup-

port three major construction phases. The full project is expected to cost approximately \$30 million and includes a new high school for grades nine through twelve, the school's first auditorium, and a new high school gymnasium.

The planned auditorium will provide dedicated space for chapel and worship, fine arts performances, school events and assemblies, and community gatherings.

The new high school has been designed with the support of local design and engineering partners, and the required permits have been submitted. Construction is set to begin in 2027.

The school has received approximately \$8 million in donations and pledges toward the campaign. Its current goal is to raise \$12 million to begin the new high school phase.

The new facilities will allow Mansfield Christian School to serve more families, expand student opportunities, and create spaces that can also support the broader community.

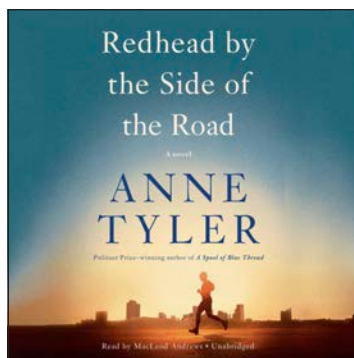

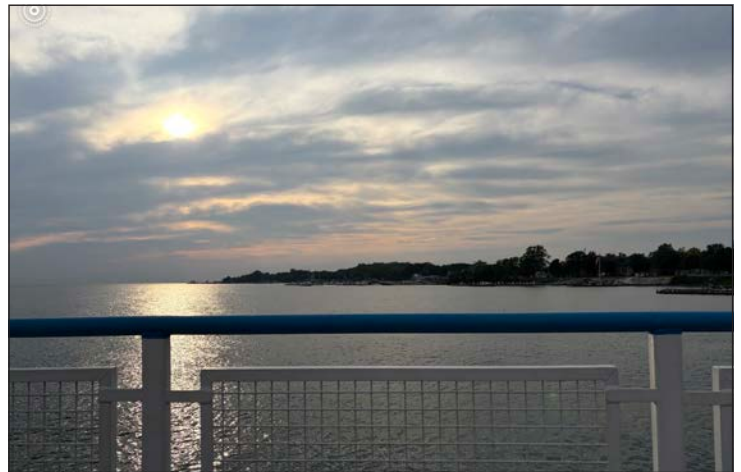

Day Trippin' With Damon – Kelleys Island and the boat ride to get there offer beautiful views and landmarks. The Glacial Grooves are the most popular natural destination on the island. The grooves are the largest and best accessible example of this geological phenomenon anywhere in the world. They are located at the intersection of Division Street and Titus Road. A paved parking lot provides easy access. The grooves are visible from the parking lot or from a winding series of steps and footbridges that loop around their upper rim. The glacial grooves are 400 feet long, 35 feet wide and up to 15 feet deep. They were created by the slow movement of the massive glacier that created the Great Lakes and Lake Erie Islands.

The event will offer two opportunities to attend: 10-11 am or 6-7 pm at Richland Pregnancy Services, 1560 W. 4th St., Mansfield.

Hope Giver is designed to give community members an inside

look at the ministry of Richland Pregnancy Services and the many ways volunteers can become involved. Attendees will have the opportunity to meet RPS staff and current volunteers, learn about available volunteer roles, ask questions in a casual setting, and discover how their unique gifts and abilities could be used to serve others.

"Volunteers are an essential part of what makes our ministry possible," said Amy Kahl, Executive Director of Richland Pregnancy Services. "There are so many different ways to serve, and you don't have to know exactly where you fit before you come. We want people to come, learn about the ministry, meet our team, and discover where God may be asking them to serve."

Volunteer opportunities at Richland Pregnancy Services include Client advocates, mentor moms and mentor dads, nurses, ultrasound assistant, boutique assistants, safety team members and other behind-the-scenes roles.

Training is provided for all positions, including ultrasound, and volunteers can serve according to their availability and abilities.

Both timeslots will include information, conversation, coffee and refreshments, and a special gift for each participant.

Community members are encouraged to attend whichever session best fits their schedule. There is no obligation to commit to volunteering by attending.

"Sometimes we think volunteering requires having a lot of time or a particular skill," Kahl said. "But every person has something valuable to offer. Our desire is that the Hope Giver event will help people see that there is a place for them at Richland Pregnancy Services."

Richland County Foundation funds education with \$367,505 in grants

The Richland County Foundation Board of Trustees approved \$367,505 in grants during its August meeting. A large portion of the grants were for educational purposes.

The board approved \$83,000 in education grants for K-12 teachers in public or private Richland County Schools to encourage them to develop new programs for their classrooms. Funding was provided from the unrestricted grant budget as well as field of interest funds. Education grants are selected by a committee made up of board members and people from the community for creative and innovative supplemental programs not covered by school funding.

The board approved 15 career technical education scholarships. This year's total so far is \$105,100 for 62 scholarships. The scholarship committee implemented a rolling deadline for CTE scholarships to meet various enrollment deadlines.

Local DAR chapter to host American Revolution traveling exhibit

The Jared Mansfield Chapter DAR has announced the opening of the American Revolution Experience at the Samuel D. Isaly Library of the Ohio Genealogical Society, 611 St. Rt. 97 West, Bellville, on Tuesday, Aug. 18.

The pop-up exhibition includes display panels and interactive digital kiosks that use storytelling, illustration, technology and artifacts and primary accounts to connect modern audiences with the people and places that shaped the birth of our nation.

Created through a collaboration between the American Battlefield Trust and the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, the exhibit is also made possible by matching funds from the National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program battlefield interpretation grants.

The exhibit will run from August 18–28, at the Samuel D. Isaly Library of the Ohio Genealogical Society in Bellville. The exhibit is available Tuesday–Friday, from 10 am to 4 pm and Saturday, Aug. 22 from 10 am to 4 pm. Special programming will be available at 2 pm each day, including talks about colonial clothing, beginning genealogy and Richland County History.

On Friday, Aug. 21, at 2 pm, a colonial militia re-enactor will educate on all aspects of life in New England during the Revolution.

The Mansfield/Richland County Library main branch, 43 W. Third St., Mansfield, will receive the exhibit on Aug. 29 and run through Sept. 5.

Special guest, George Washington, will be in the community room at the main branch on Saturday, Aug. 29 at 2 pm for his presentation about the Miracle of the Crossing of Delaware. On Wednesday, Sept. 2, at 6:30 pm, participants will learn about colonial clothing.

The American Revolution Experience launched online in its first digital-only iteration during the summer of 2022 to rapid acclaim and received a Bronze Award in the Education, Art, & Culture division of the second annual Anthem Awards, an initiative of the Webby Awards celebrating purpose and mission-driven work. It was also a finalist in the "People's Choice" category of the Webbys themselves.

The traveling exhibit includes 12 panels highlighting thematic connections between profiled individuals and three interactive kiosks that connect to the full digital biographies, provide documentary context on the Revolutionary War and offer information on how to visit the places tied to these individuals today. Both online and on-site, the American Revolution Experience features custom illustrations by South Carolina-based artist Dale Watson. The exhibit also draws from documents and objects in DAR's collection, as well as the Trust's industry leading digital interpretation resources.

"Independence may have been declared in Philadelphia by the Declaration's 56 signers, but it was hard-won on the battlefields we protect by the thousands of Patriot soldiers from whom today's Daughters trace descent," said Trust President David Duncan. "Together, our organizations bear witness to the fact that we are not so far removed from those impactful events, that there are meaningful ways to bridge those 250 years."

The Samuel D. Isaly Library of the Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS) and the Mansfield/Richland County Library Main branch are among the scores of libraries, historical societies and museums that will host the American Revolution Experience through 2027, introducing visitors to a cast of historical characters with diverse experiences throughout the conflict and the places they visited on their journey. Individual DAR chapters across the nation, including Jared Mansfield Chapter DAR, have partnered with institutions in their communities to offer venues for the exhibit, booking its current complement of copies to capacity.

The American Revolution Experience invites visitors to consider the choice faced by members of the revolutionary generation as tensions mounted in the 1770s: Would these ordinary citizens risk their lives and livelihoods in pursuit of liberty? Or would they remain loyal subjects of the British crown, coming into conflict with neighbors and family? The exhibit surfaces diverse viewpoints and experiences, touching on the journeys — both literal and figurative — of Patriots and Loyalists, men and women, Black and Native populations and even international allies. Rather than focusing only on generals and famous statesmen, it introduces audiences to drummer boys, military mapmakers and other ordinary people who were impacted by global events

Ontario to conduct sanitary sewer smoke testing

The City of Ontario Utilities Department, in partnership with K.E. McCartney, will conduct citywide sanitary sewer smoke testing from August into September.

The schedule will be: areas 1 and 2, July 27–Aug. 7; areas 3 and 4, Aug. 3–14; areas 5 and 6, Aug. 10–21; areas 7, 8 and 9, Aug 17–28; and areas 10, 11 and 12, Aug. 24–Sept 4.

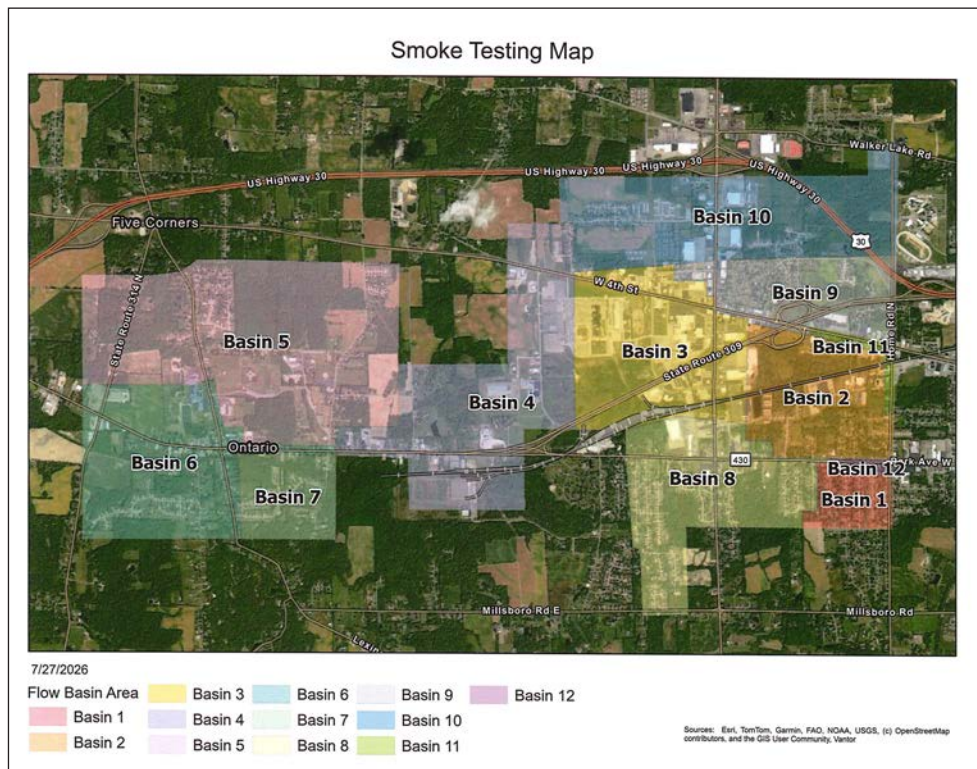
Testing will be performed by introducing smoke into the sanitary sewer system from the City’s main sewer line. The smoke is non-toxic and harmless to people, pets, food and property. Smoke may appear from roof vents, downspouts, building foundations or manhole covers.

If a home is properly connected to the sanitary sewer, smoke is unlikely to enter a house.

To reduce the chance of smoke entering a home, please run water through all floor drains and sinks to ensure each trap contains water.

If smoke enters a home, open the windows until it clears. Although the smoke is harmless, it may temporarily irritate nasal passages. If irritation occurs, leave the premises until the smoke has cleared.

The couple had spent years considering different locations and properties before finding the right place to bring that vision to life in Bellville.

Even the name carries a special family connection. “GB” represents two of the Sansoms’ children, Gage and Bryn, while adding “House” created the initials “GBH” and brought their oldest daughter, Halen, into the name as well.

Living up to its slogan, “Valley Grounded, Hometown Grown,” the coffeehouse offers coffee, tea, smoothies, pastries and specialty drinks while also highlighting products from local artisans, authors, bakers and other small businesses. Locally roasted coffee, honey, maple syrup, flowers and cards are among the items featured throughout the shop.

The new space includes indoor seating and a covered patio, giving customers room to sit and stay awhile. The Sansoms also plan to host live music and community events for all ages, and the venue will be available for Sunday rentals for parties, small groups and special gatherings.

Mindy, who previously founded the Clear Fork Christian Pre-school & Learning Center in Butler, is a first-grade teacher at Bellville Elementary. Jeremy works in human resources for Global Energy Partners.

HEAP assistance available for Ohio residents

The Ohio Department of Job and Family Services and Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. are offering assistance to help Ohio's families stay cool during the hot summer months.

Until Sept. 30, income-eligible Ohioans can receive assistance in paying their electric bill, purchasing an air conditioner or fan, or making repairs to their central air conditioning unit through the Home Energy Assistance Summer Crisis Program (HEAP).

The Summer Crisis Program assists low-income households and those that have a disconnection notice, have been shut off, are trying to establish new service on their electric bill, require air conditioning, or those with a household member age 60 or older and/or a household member with a documented medical condition.

Qualifying medical conditions can include lung disease, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease, asthma and other health conditions. To qualify for assistance, Ohioans must have a gross income at or below 175 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for a family of up to seven members, and 60 percent of the State Median Income for a family of eight or more members.

To apply, clients are required to schedule an appointment with your local Community Action Commission. They need to bring copies of their most recent energy bills, a list of all household members and proof of income for the last 30 days or 12 months for each member, proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members, proof of disability (if applicable) and physician documentation that cooling assistance is needed for a household member's health. Ohioans reminded to contact 811 before digging to avoid utility lines

Columbia Gas of Ohio is reminding homeowners and contractors across the state to contact 811 before beginning any digging project.

Contacting 811 at least two full working days before digging allows utility professionals to mark the approximate location of underground lines. This free service helps prevent damage to critical infrastructure and reduces the risk of injuries, service disruptions and costly repairs.

"Contacting 811 is not only quick and easy — it's the law and it protects people and property," said Columbia Gas of Ohio President and Chief Operating Officer Bob Heidorn. "Even a small project can lead to serious consequences if underground lines are damaged. A little planning goes a long way."

Common projects like installing fences, planting trees or building decks all require a locate request.

Because erosion and prior construction can affect line depth, underground utilities may be closer to the surface than expected.

By calling 811 or visiting the Ohio Utilities Protection Service (OUPS), residents are connected to the state's one-call system, which coordinates with utility companies to mark lines using color-coded paint or flags.

Before starting any project, customers should contact 811 at least two full working days in advance, not including the day of notification. This allows crews time to confirm that all utility lines have been marked and to review the location of markings before digging begins. Never assume utility lines are deeper than expected or located where work has occurred previously.

Anyone who damages a natural gas line or suspects a gas leak should stop work immediately, leave the area and call 911 from a safe location.
