Richland County Foundation funds community needs

The Richland County Foundation Board of Trustees approved grants totaling \$923,634.86 during its June meeting.

Competitive and field of interest grants approved by the board in-

cluded the following grants:

Habitat for Humanity of Richland and Crawford Counties received a grant for Building Futures Together which is a collaborative effort between HHRCC and Pioneer Career & Technology Center, focused on expanding access to affordable housing while providing handson workforce training for local students. During the 2025–2026 academic year, Pioneer students will construct a new Habitat home in Shelby. The partnership offers a life-changing opportunity for a family in need, while also equipping the next generation with valuable skills.

The City of Mansfield Police Department received a grant for a Therapy K9 Team which includes a canine named Charlie. Charlie will be assigned to the Mansfield Senior High School Resource Officer, and it will be a part of the Community Police Unit. The Therapy K9 Team will be a resource for students, teachers, and staff affected by trauma. The Police Department believes the K9 Therapy Team will have a positive impact on relationships between law enforcement and community members.

The Lucas Community Center received a grant for an outdoor deck. For safety reasons the deck and a retaining wall must be rebuilt. The deck is utilized as a gathering space and allows access to the sand volleyball courts.

The North Central Ohio Land Conservancy received a grant to expand its trail by a quarter mile and to protect the view of adjoining properties that are a part of the Clear Fork Valley Scenic Trail. The trail serves hikers in southern Richland County.

The Richland Community Development Group received a grant for BrandRichland which is a project in the Foundation's Mansfield Rising Plan. BrandRichland is a strategic, marketing campaign designed to shift perception, build civic pride, and attract new residents, talent, and investment to Richland County. With the foundational brand identity now fully developed, this project represents the implementation phase: launching internal and external awareness campaigns that tell a compelling and cohesive story of who we are as a community.

The Board of Trustees approved grants from donor advised funds which allow individuals, families, and corporations the opportunity to make grant suggestions to their favorite charities. Donor advised funds are a flexible and convenient alternative to a private foundation. It is also a way to keep charitable contributions anonymous, at the preference of the donor.

Organizations receiving grants from donor advised funds include Denison University, Discovery School, Downtown Mansfield, Inc., First Congregational Church of Mansfield, Furniture Bank of North Central Ohio, Honey from the Rock LLC, Love on a Mission, Lucas Community Center, Mansfield Art Center, Mansfield Community Playhouse, North Central State College, Ohio Bird Sanctuary, Pioneer Career Technical Center, Pleasant Hill Outdoor Camp, Richland Academy of the Arts, Richland Carrousel Park, Richland Community Development Group, Richland Historical Society, Ronald McDonald House Charities of Central Ohio, Shakespeare Company of Mansfield, Shalom Christian Missions, St. Paul Outreach Center, St. Peter's Parish, Taking Root Farms, Third Street Family Health Services, Wayfinders Ohio and Wayne Center for the Arts.

The Board of Trustees also awarded seven scholarships to students attending a career technical education school. The Scholarship Committee implemented a rolling deadline for CTE scholarships to meet various enrollment deadlines. Aligning with Ohio's Attainment Goal, the Foundation wants to help fill the gap between job openings and certified employees as well as lead the way to support workforce development through CTE scholarships.



THE NORTH CENTRAL OHIO LAND CONSERVANCY received a grant to expand the Clear Fork Valley Scenic Trail. Located between the Richland County B&O Bike Trail to the south and the Malabar Farm and Mohican State Parks, The Clear Fork Valley Scenic Trail offers over nine miles of hiking trails, including loops and spurs.


The rodeo will be held Wednesday at 7 pm. Grandstand seating is free with \$10 reserved seats available.

Also at 7 pm will be the Jr. Fair Talent Show in the John Hartz Building.


At 1:30 pm, the Barnyard Olympics will be held in the show arena on Thursday.

As the busy Fourth of July holiday week gets closer, the American Red Cross asks donors to celebrate by making a blood or platelet donation appointment to help power the blood supply through mid-summer. While all blood types are needed, donors with type O blood are most urgently needed.

Making and keeping donation appointments now is critical to ensuring blood products are available for all patients — including those in trauma situations that may require several lifesaving transfusions in the weeks to come.

Type O negative blood is often reached for in emergencies when there isn't time to match a patient's blood type.

Type O positive is the most common blood type, so it's important to keep type O blood and all blood types on hand at hospitals for people facing both chronic illness and sudden, life-threatening con-



The American Recovery Plan Act: How local funds are being utilized

The American Recovery Plan Act is a U.S. Congresional Act that was initiated in response to the financial hardships imposed on all levels of government entities by Covid-19. It became effective in March of 2021.

Funds were processed via state and local government entities (counties, cities, villages and townships). The application deadline was Dec. 31, 2024 and approved contracts must be completed by Dec. 24, 2026

I was interested in how the act has benefited the Richland County Community and performed informal research in the interest of informing county residents of the benefits of this Congressional Act.

The data included below was made available by the varied government entities. The major "project" expenses are broken down in the accompanying pieces of the report. These reports include Richland County, and the cities of Mansfield, Shelby and Ontario.

Financial information was obtained from local government offices and from varied website articles. Cost figures noted were from the 2024 fourth quarter reports. It is not my contention that my numbers and math are completely accurate — tracking such large amounts of money was tricky business.

Richland County received \$23,532,744 through the county com-

Richland County received \$23,532,744 through the county commissioners with the City of Mansfield receiving \$20,995,402; City of Shelby receiving \$949,753 and the City of Ontario receiving \$639,850.

Villages received \$1,106,275, broken down by Lexington, \$492,402; Bellville, \$203,082; Plymouth, \$189,410; Butler, \$94,021; Shiloh, \$65,100; and Lucas, \$62,260.

Townships received a total of \$5,235,106, going to Plymouth, \$113,898; Cass, \$102,435; Bloominggrove, \$122,312; Butler, \$122,733; Sharon, \$91,497; Jackson, \$252,722; Franklin, \$174,791; Weller, \$182,469; Springfield, \$457,066; Sandusky, \$99,490; Madison, \$1,136,143; Mifflin, \$637,957; Troy, \$250,292; Washington, \$621,761; Monroe, \$215,387; Perry, \$150,497; Jefferson, \$304,360; and Worthington, \$199,296. The grand total is \$52,459,127.

The City of Ontario received a grand total of \$639,850, as reported by the auditor. The city spent these funds on park systems, \$539,223 (Marshall, Spray and Stowell); city hall security, \$45,000; Village Mall Dr., paving \$46,590; and street light repair on Stumbo Rd., \$9,037.

The City of Shelby received a grand total of \$949,753, as reported by the treasurer's office. In essence, they used these funds under the revenue replacement category to recuperate wages paid to their police and fire department personnel during and after the Covid-19 pandemic along with other allowable project expenses.

In turn, the money obtained allowed the city to use the enhanced general fund monies for other uses, including \$100,000 for the Blackfort Commons project and \$150,000 for a new ambulance.

The City of Mansfield received a grand total of \$5,043,368 for public safety including for police vehicles, \$809,768; police radio replacements, \$642,525; police dispatch system, \$333,386; police salary retention costs, \$753,093; miscellaneous police costs, \$704,045; fire department salaries and station upgrades, \$831,413; maintenance vehicles, \$439,823; tornado sirens, \$142,315; and traffic signal updates, \$387,000.

Strong Healthy Communities: A grand total of \$3,364,809 for multiple city park updates, \$769,973; Sterkel Park \$389,836; bike path, tunnel and extension to Home Rd., \$750,000; Wayfinders (Harmony House), \$500,000; west end target area (Glessner Ave. area), \$200,000; Catholic Charities \$210,000; small business assistance, \$545,000.

Infrastructure: A grand total of \$9,837,417 (rounded) went for the city administration building which includes major repairs and updates, space redesign, and major preservation maintenance projects, \$4.3 million; Third and Fourth St. sewer updates, \$2 million; industrial waterline loop, \$750,000; sidewalks (King St. and Johns Park), \$385,315; Clearfork Dam, \$1 million; HVAC upgrades (city building, airport, police training center, fire department), \$902,102; and Westinghouse Demolition, \$500,000.

Administration: A grand total of \$1,622,092 went towards the installation of six new servers \$352,092; AFSCME premium pay, \$600,000; non-bargaining employees pay, \$470,000; Oracle software, \$200,000

The grand total was \$19,867,686.



Nominations are now being accepted for farmers and ranchers to serve on local U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees. These committees make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally. All nomination forms for the 2025 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 1, 2025.

'Serving on an FSA county committee provides producers with a unique opportunity to have a say in local farm program decisions, ensuring FSA policies work, as intended, for producers at the county level." said FSA Administrator Bill Beam.

Elections for committee members will occur in certain Local Administrative Areas (LAA). LAAs are elective areas for FSA committees in a single county or multi-county jurisdiction and may include LAAs that are focused on an urban or suburban area. Visit fsa.usda. gov/elections to determine if a LAA is up for election.

Agricultural producers may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee if they participate or cooperate in a USDA program and reside in the LAA that is up for election this year.

A cooperating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation to FSA, even if they have not applied or received program benefits.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others and qualifying organizations may also nominate candidates. USDA encourages all eligible producers to nominate, vote and hold office.

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated members of the agriculture community serve on FSA county committees. The committees are made up of three to 11 members who serve three-year terms. Committee members play a key role in how FSA delivers disaster recovery, conservation, commodity and price support programs, as well as making decisions on county office employment and other agricultural issues.

FSA urban county committees work to promote urban, indoor and other emerging agricultural production practices. Members are nominated and elected to serve by local urban producers in the same jurisdiction. Members provide outreach to ensure urban producers understand USDA programs, serve as the voice of other urban producers and assist in program implementation.

The 27 cities with urban county committees are listed at fsa.usda. gov/elections and farmers.gov/urban.

Producers should contact their local FSA office to register and find out how to get involved in their county's election, including if their LAA is up for election this year. To be considered, a producer must be registered and sign an FSA-669A nomination form. This form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at fsa.usda.gov/elections. All nomination forms for the 2025 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by the Aug.1, 2025, deadline. Election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters in November 2025.
