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Madison BOE heads into summer with busy meeting

The Madison Local School District Board of Education held its regular meeting on Wednesday, June 17.

The meeting opened with presentations from Renee Neron, curriculum and instruction; and Matt Blankenship, food services.

A donation of \$1,000 was accepted from Altrusa International, to be used to purchase feminine hygiene products for MACC students.

A donation of \$3,000 came from the Middle School PTO, to be used towards outstanding fees and lunch balances for fifth and sixth grade students. The board also accepted a donation of hygiene and household items from Candy Brenner, to be used by the Rams Care Closet.

Treasurer Bradd Stevens' monthly financial report for May was approved and approval was given for the revised permanent appropriations for FY 2026 and temporary appropriations for FY 2027, not to exceed 50% of the FY 2026 appropriations at fund level.

Blanket and super blanket purchase orders were approved for amounts not to exceed \$500,000 per order for FY 2027.

The treasurer was authorized to make the necessary appropriation modifications, transfers and advances, and to request from the county auditor an amended certificate for the purpose of closing out FY 2026.

An insurance quote from Rinehart, Walters and Danner was accepted for fleet and liability insurance and the board authorized the execution of accepting coverage from the Ohio School Plan for 2026-'27.

The board approved a transfer of \$1,930.12 from the general fund to food service for the current inactive debt for inactive students who are 19 years of age.

A resolution was approved for the necessity of a ten-mill levy renewal tax. The resolution states that it will go to the voters for a 6.90 levy renewal for five years. The original levy was approved by the voters on May 3, 2022. The district will also ask for a 7.50 levy renewal for five years. This was originally approved by the voters on Nov. 7, 2023.

The board approved a community taxation policy. The primary aim of this policy is to set clear targets and guidelines for generating tax revenue to support school district activities and to achieve financial stability. It also aims to create a long-term plan to minimize the need for frequent requests for new taxes from taxpayers.

Resignations were accepted from Calvin Gordon, assistant varsity football; Heather Argo, fourth grade ELA/social studies; Kaitlyn Fanning, middle/high school band; Brianna Barr, middle school intervention specialist; Melissa Parish, assistant varsity swim; Kathie Jansen, third grade ELA/social studies, retirement; Adolph Hathaway, intervention specialist; and Lukas Mann, high school band assistant.

Resignations were also accepted from Holly Beidelschies, library tech; Darla Noblet, bus driver, Route 11; and Natalie Lewis, MECLC assistant teacher.

Hirings for the 2026-'27 school year include Amy O'Connell, high school intervention specialist; Sierra McLaughlin, preschool teacher; Melissa Beverly, high school math teacher; Julia Litt, middle school intervention specialist; Dominique Tozzi, high school math teacher; Elizabeth Sims, third grade ELA/social studies teacher; and Lukas Mann, middle/high school instrumental/general music and band director.

The board approved items for the 2026-'27 school year including the student fee structure, K-4 and 5-12 student handbooks, the purchase of i-Ready assessment and personalized instruction for math and reading for grades K-8 from Curriculum Associates in the amount of \$60,030.50, an overnight eighth grade student trip to Washington, D.C. May 10 -12, 2027 at no cost to the board; and the Independent Contractor Agreement between Madison Local Schools and the Silver Lining Group for ABA services from June 1, 2026 to May 28, 2027, in the amount of \$12,030 per month.

The board also approved a therapy services contract with EJ Therapy to provide therapy services for the 2026-'27 and 2027-'28 school

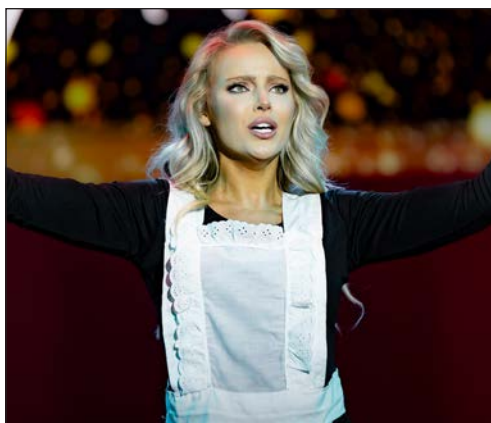

The Archers prefer to be called communarians rather than philanthropists. They insist on giving locally and during their lifetimes. "We plan to die broke," Bob said, laughing.

Like many Ashland County residents, the Archers have seen the impact of UH Samaritan. Local access to care for cardiovascular events can make a lifesaving difference – and even more so when that care comes with the resources and capabilities of the globally trusted UH Harrington Heart & Vascular Institute. The same can be said of local access to cancer care at UH Seidman Cancer & Infusion Center at UH Samaritan.

"What would we do without UH here in Ashland?" Jan said.

The gift honors several individuals who shaped UH Samaritan's history and ethos, including Dick Beal, former president of the UH Samaritan Hospital Foundation; Bill Kelley and Danny Boggs, former chief executives of the formerly known Samaritan Hospital; and Sylvia Radziszewski, who is the current Chief Operating Officer of UH Samaritan Medical Center. In recognition of the Archers' generosity, the hospital's main reception area has been named the Robert M. and Janet L. Archer Lobby.

Radziszewski emphasized the significance of the Archers' gift in today's environment. "Unlike other businesses, healthcare doesn't have many levers to pull," she explained. Renaissance begins massive restoration project

Visitors to the Renaissance Theatre this summer may notice something strikingly different: the seats in the auditorium have been fully removed, marking a significant step forward in a comprehensive renovation effort that is already well underway.

This visible transformation is part of the "Road to 100," a multi-year initiative designed to prepare the Renaissance Theatre for its 100th anniversary in 2028. The project represents a strategic investment in the facility, its audiences, and its long-term sustainability to ensure that the theatre continues to serve as a cultural cornerstone for generations to come.

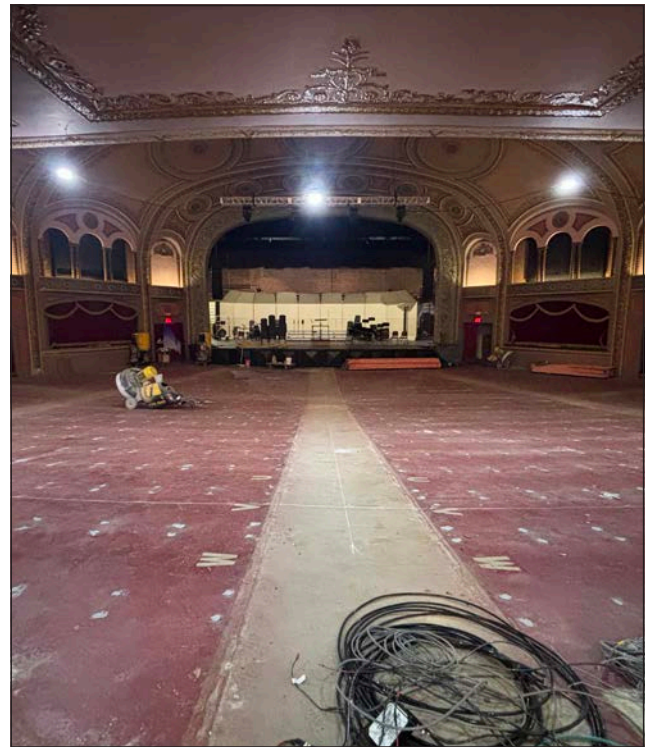
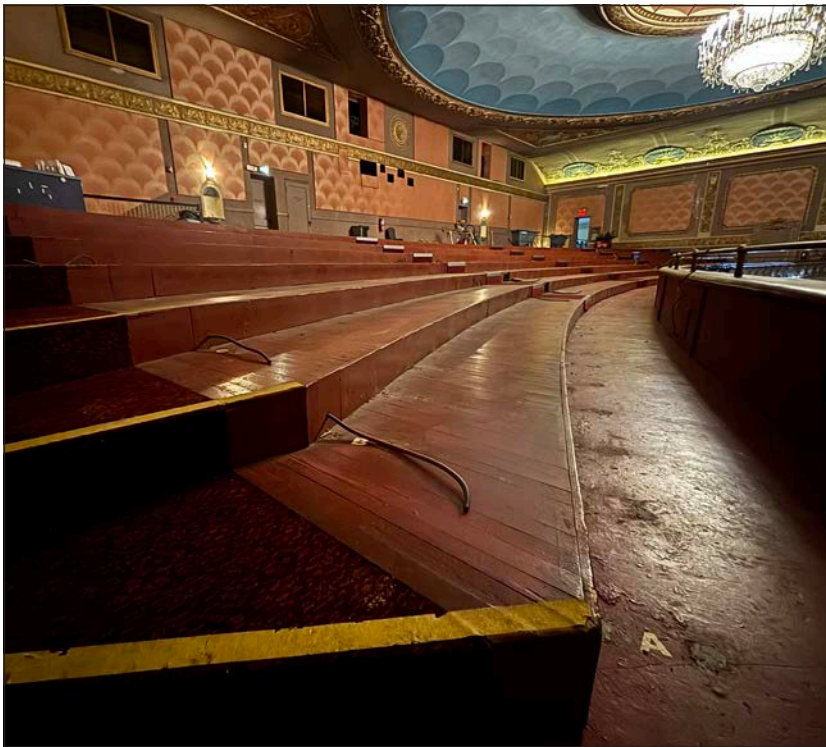
For nearly a century, the Renaissance Theatre has been central to the cultural life of Mansfield and the surrounding region, welcoming tens of thousands of patrons, students, and artists each year and generating an economic impact of \$4 million annually. As a three-year master plan leading up to the centennial, the Road to 100 builds on that legacy through a focused commitment to safety, accessibility, historic preservation, and transformation of a main artery into downtown Mansfield. Situated near the corner of Park and Marion Avenues, the Renaissance campus includes the historic main building (the 1928 Ohio Theatre) and its 2010 addition, a green space, a black box theatre (Theatre 166) and roughly 300 parking spaces on its five acres.

Magnifying state capital and one-time strategic reinvestment

funding, grants from the State of Ohio paired with matching support through private philanthropy have supported a range of completed and in-progress improvements to date: enhanced sidewalks and entryways to improve accessibility, safety and security upgrades, and the design and initial fabrication of a new, historically representative marquee.

The current removal of auditorium seating signals the next major phase of the project: the installation of new seating in the main theatre and the resurfacing of its floor. This work will improve comfort, safety, and accessibility while preserving the architectural character of the historic space, including the refurbishment of the seats' original end caps. As part of this effort, the Renaissance has launched its "Take a Seat" program, offering community members the opportunity to dedicate a seat in their name or in honor of a loved one.

Additional projects within the Road to 100 plan will continue over the next two years, including enhanced exterior lighting and restoration of historic architectural details, alongside new outdoor elements such as a sculptural bridge, marquee blade, and the creation of an interactive pocket park, a multi-use green space designed to foster connection and create a more welcoming, engaging campus for the surrounding community. The plan aligns with broader downtown revitalization efforts, including the Main Street corridor project, to support the continued development and vibrancy of Park Avenue West.

FROM PREK TO GRADUATION: One Student's Journey through Mansfield Christian School

MANSFIELD — Applause filled the auditorium as Kendall Wushinske stepped to the podium on graduation day.

The confident senior addressing her classmates looked nothing like the little girl who once struggled to leave her mom's side on her first days of school.

Yet both moments happened at Mansfield Christian School.

Kendall's journey began in PreK and stretched all the way to graduation. Along the way, teachers became mentors, classmates became lifelong friends, and lessons in faith helped shape the young woman she is today.

One memory still stands out.

A rough morning left young Kendall upset and reluctant to say goodbye to her mom. PreK teacher Mrs. Lilly noticed immediately. She invited Kendall to sit on her lap during carpet time and helped calm her fears.

"She really made me feel special," Kendall recalled.

Small moments like that became the foundation of her MCS experience.

Chapel services. Field days. Classroom pets. Star Student celebrations.

The memories accumulated quickly, but the relationships left the deepest mark.

Teachers knew her long before she entered their classrooms. Some knew her family. Others watched her grow from year to year. Smaller class sizes allowed educators to invest in students beyond academics.

"They were able to really learn about each student and know them as a person," Kendall said.

Two teachers, Mr. and Mrs. Hostetler, stand out among the many who influenced her.

"They never made me feel like I was a little kid," she said. "They always treated me with respect and valued hearing my opinions."

The couple challenged her academically while encouraging her spiritually. Conversations about faith pushed her to think deeply and develop habits that would remain with her long after elementary school.

Teacher after teacher poured into her life.

Some taught study skills. Others modeled grace. Many offered encouragement during difficult seasons. Together, they helped shape both her character and her faith.

Years later, those lessons continue to influence how she views the world.

"I am ready for whatever questions come my way," Kendall said. "I can accurately share the Gospel with others and know how to answer the hard questions the culture engages."

Her high school years opened new doors.

The MCCAP Healthcare Program sparked a passion for caring for others and introduced her to a variety of healthcare careers. The experience helped her identify her strengths, develop a plan for the future and discover a calling she plans to pursue as a physician assistant.

"That program helped me realize my love for caring for others," she said.

Graduation may mark the end of Kendall's time at MCS, but it also highlights the value of starting early.

Families today can begin a similar journey through Mansfield Christian School's day-care and preschool programs. Located on the school's 90-acre wooded campus, the programs provide a Christ-centered environment where children learn foundational academic skills while discovering biblical truths that will guide them for years to come.

For Kendall, those early years mattered.

"I learned Bible stories, the fruit of the Spirit and even how to pray," she said. "Those are practical life skills and steppingstones to the deeper content I learned later."

Now, after spending her entire educational journey at MCS, Kendall has simple advice for both parents and young students.

"Don't be afraid of what is to come," she said. "You have people around you to support you and people that want to help you."

The applause that echoed through the auditorium on graduation day celebrated what began with a little girl in PreK and ended with a young woman prepared to follow God's calling.

Mansfield Christian's "DReam Team" serves communities, builds lasting friendships in Dominican Republic

Faith, service and life changing connections happened this spring as a team from Mansfield Christian School traveled to the Dominican Republic for a nine-day mission trip centered on outreach, ministry and relationship-building.

In March 2026, 45 staff members, teachers, parents and students from the school traveled to Fountain of Life School in the village of Juan Tomas, where they partnered with local staff and students to serve the community in both practical and spiritual ways.

Throughout the trip, team members participated in a variety of ministry efforts, including attending chapel services, visiting classrooms and assisting with English and math instruction for students ranging from elementary through high school grades.

One of the week's highlights was hosting a Vacation Bible School for children in the village. The program included songs, puppets, games, crafts and a Bible lesson focused on the resurrection. The week concluded with an Easter egg hunt featuring more than 900 eggs prepared and hidden by the team.

In addition to classroom ministry, the group completed several hands-on projects to support the school and surrounding village. Team members helped prepare a gravel section for the elementary playground, constructed walls in the boys' dormitory, built benches, created a feeding trough for goats, painted offices and homes, and laid a concrete floor for a woman in the community.

Beyond the work projects, students said the relationships formed during the trip made the greatest impact.

"I liked relationship building the most," student Katelynn Miller shared.

Mara Chase reflected on a worship service during the trip.

"One of my God moments was during church," Chase said. "It was so cool to see and hear everyone worshipping in English and Spanish."

Another student shared how meeting a sponsored child personally deepened their faith and perspective.

"My eyes were opened to the world's struggles," the student said. "I learned that true joy comes from God, not belongings, which we saw so clearly from the Dominican people."

Student Logan Wilson said he joined the trip hoping to gain a greater appreciation for life in America while serving others through his faith. He said the experience helped him develop practical skills through construction projects while also teaching him important lessons about joy, community and gratitude.

"They are energetic and fun," Wilson said of the Dominican people. "I was impacted by their joy and sense of contentment with what little they had materially."

Wilson encouraged future students to consider participating in future trips.

"You get good experience with hard work, meet new people, learn about a new culture and live out your faith in a tangible way," he said.

Riley Patrick, who previously traveled to the Dominican Republic in 2024 and returned again this year, said revisiting the community gave him a new understanding of the purpose of mission work.

"What amazed me is when we walked through the doors, they welcomed us like old friends they wanted to party with," Patrick said. "That is the reality of missions. It's the connections you make. The relationships you cultivate. The people you get to pray with."

throughout the week.

Ohio Senate passes education bills to enact historic changes

The Ohio Senate concurred on Senate Bill 19, sponsored by Senator Andrew Brenner (R-Delaware), which enacts historic changes to Ohio's education law to improve education Quality for Ohio's students.

The bill seeks to encourage improvement in math for Ohio's students, requiring that any school building with 51% or more of students scoring limited on an end-of-course mathematics assessment, the schools must submit a Math Achievement Improvement Plan to the Department of Education and Workforce.

"The bill not only addresses the needs of struggling students," said Senator Brenner. "It also creates accelerated learning opportunities for high-achieving students."

The bill includes several other targeted changes, but one major measure is that intervention efforts to the building level rather than the school district level. This is to ensure schools with the greatest need receive more focused attention and support.

"It is my hope that by providing supports for both struggling and advanced students," said Sen. Brenner, "We will see meaningful improvement across all levels of mathematical achievement."

The Senate will now send SB 19 to Governor DeWine and awaits his signature.

The Ohio Senate also passed Senate Bill 311, sponsored by Senator Andrew Brenner (R-Delaware), which establishes several key reforms to promote accountability and integrity in Ohio's education system.

The bill seeks to prohibit organizations from helping students cheat while still protecting legitimate tutoring and educational help.

"We can't let bad actors monetize helping students cheat," Sen. Brenner said. "This bill gives the Attorney General and affected institutions the ability to pursue civil penalties against those who undermine academic integrity."

The bill includes several other measures including strengthening educator accountability, improves the management of unused school facilities, and protects educational opportunity by preventing local governments from excluding public or chartered nonpublic schools solely through zoning restrictions.

"I'm grateful that my colleagues saw the importance of this bill," Senator Brenner shared. "Academic integrity and accountability is just commonsense."

The Ohio Senate sent SB 311 to the Ohio House for further consideration.

Ohio Goes to the Movies event will give free showing of "Parachute Nurse"

The Crawford County History Alliance and the Galion Community Theatre will present a special showing of *Parachute Nurse* an "Ohio Goes to the Movies" event in honor of America 250.

Ohio is celebrating its big-screen legacy with state-wide movie showings in all 88 counties.

The alliance, in collaboration with the state program, "Ohio Goes to the Movies" and the Galion Community Theatre, will present the World War II-era film on Monday, June 29, at the historic Galion Community Theatre.

Doors will open at 6 pm with the film beginning at 6:30 pm. Admission is free and open to the public.

Parachute Nurse, a 1942 Columbia Pictures film, is loosely based on the life of Bucyrus LaureWa Schimmoler, founder of the Aerial Nurse Corps of America and a pioneering figure in aviation nursing.

Schimmoler's contributions inspired the film, making this screening a special opportunity to honor a local historical figure whose influence soared far beyond Crawford County. She has a small role in the film and also served as a consultant.

Before the screening, guests are invited to explore mini-exhibits hosted by the Bucyrus Historical Society and the Lauretta Schimmoler Museum, beginning at 6 pm.

Following the one-hour film, there will be a panel discussion featuring a MedFlight nurse, offering insights into the evolution of air medical transport and the legacy of Schimmoler's vision.

Members of the Galion Community Theatre, Bucyrus Historical Society (designated by Schimmoler to house her personal and professional artifacts) and the Lauretta Schimmoler Museum will also be part of the discussion panel.

This event combines a local history connection, classic World War II cinema and modern aviation medicine in a way that honors one of Crawford County's most influential pioneers.

Mosquitoes carrying West Nile Virus detected in Mansfield

Richland Public Health officials have been notified by the Ohio Department of Health that West Nile Virus (WNV) has been detected in mosquitoes in the City of Mansfield.

"To be very clear, this is not a human infection case, but the first positive WNV mosquito samples in Richland County this year," Joe Harrod, Director of Environmental Health at Richland Public Health, stated. Health Department officials will continue to monitor the WNV positive areas in the City of Mansfield to discourage potential transmission of the mosquito-borne illness to residents.

West Nile Virus is a mosquito-borne virus where human symptoms are generally mild and often mimic the flu. In extreme cases, WNV can cause Encephalitis (inflammation of the brain), Meningitis (inflammation of lining of the brain and the spinal cord) or death. Approximately 80 percent of people who are infected with WNV will not show any symptoms at all. Those who develop symptoms usually do so between three to 14 days after they are bitten by an infected mosquito. There is no specific treatment for WNV infection and care is based on symptom control and/or relief. The best way to prevent West Nile Virus is to prevent mosquito bites.

RPH's Mosquito Control Program conducts surveillance, treats, and sprays throughout the season to monitor mosquito populations and mosquito-spread disease throughout the county. Residents are asked to eliminate standing water and take precautions to protect themselves and loved ones from mosquito bites.

Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water, which includes puddles, stagnant ditches, and containers such as old tires, buckets, cans, neglected swimming pools and flower pots. Mosquitoes can carry diseases, including West Nile Virus, which can cause serious illness. It is important to apply mosquito repellent when participating in any outdoor activity when mosquitoes are active.

Richland Public Health recommends residents follow these tips to help avoid mosquito bites:

- Make sure that doors and windows have tight-fitting screens
- Repair or replace all torn screens in your home
- Remove all discarded tires from your property
- Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or similar water-holding containers.
- Make sure roof gutters drain properly. Clean clogged gutters in the spring and fall
- Clean and chlorinate swimming pools, outdoor saunas and hot tubs
- Drain water from pool covers
- Change the water in bird baths at least once a week
- Turn over plastic wading pools, wheelbarrows, etc. when not in use
- Clean ditches of obstructions so they drain properly.
- Eliminate any standing water that collects on your property.
- Check trees for cavities that hold water and fill them with soil, gravel or sand
- Remind or help neighbors to eliminate breeding sites
- Use insect repellent and follow the label directions

Grants available through Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council

State Representative Marilyn John (R-Richland County) recently announced new grant opportunities available through the Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council (ODDC).

ODDC is accepting applications for 16 new projects aimed at improving opportunities and outcomes for Ohioans with developmental disabilities. Projects range from developing inclusive athletic programs in K-12 schools to equipping individuals with developmental disabilities to live independently.

The application deadline is July 10, at 11:59 p.m. with the five-year project cycle beginning on Oct. 1, 2026.

"This is an incredible opportunity to support those with developmental disabilities and to continue to make Ohio a place where all Ohioans can succeed and thrive," said John.

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Rep. John champions regional projects, votes in support of bill

State Representative Marilyn John (R-Shelby) voted in support of Ohio's Capital Budget bill, a two-year capital improvements budget for state and community projects throughout Ohio totaling nearly \$4 billion. As part of the bill, Rep. John championed multiple projects for Richland County, including funding for the Mansfield Playhouse Project and Taking Root Farms.

Senate Bill 450 provides appropriations for state infrastructure needs, including renovations to state offices, new construction for mental health facilities, land acquisition, and equipment. The plan also includes just over \$200 million for community projects, which are projects that come from outside of state agencies and have a benefit or nexus to the state.

As part of the Capital Budget, Rep. John helped secure \$1,000,000 for the Mansfield Playhouse Project.

"Our current building in downtown Mansfield is in bad shape and not worth the expense of renovating. As our area's community theater, we need a new home, soon," said Doug Wertz, President/Artistic Director of The Mansfield Playhouse. The Playhouse is celebrating its 100th Anniversary season this year.

"Our State Representative Marilyn John, State Sen. Mark Romanchuk and the State of Ohio are helping to make that possible. We are thrilled with the State's \$1 million grant as we get even closer to our goal of \$5.5 million. With the state gift, we will have \$3.2 million toward our \$5.5 million goal to build a new building," Wertz said.

"We are going to build a new, accessible building that will preserve our 100-year legacy. It will allow us to continue to deliver the same high-quality, affordable theatrical experiences," Wertz added.

"The Mansfield Playhouse is a unique and cherished part of Richland County's identity, and I congratulate everyone involved on receiving state capital budget funding," said Rep. John. "This investment will support the continued preservation and growth of this historic venue, allowing it to serve as a center for arts, culture, and community for years to come."

Additionally, Rep. John championed \$400,000 for Taking Root Farms – Field of Opportunities.

Director of Operations Angela Eisaman states "Every person deserves the chance to live a life filled with purpose, connection, and belonging. At Taking Root Farms, we believe adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities should be fully seen, fully included, and fully valued for who they are. We are deeply grateful to Representative Marilyn John and Senator Mark Romanchuk, whose leadership reflects the belief that the strength of a community is measured by how well it embraces every one of its members."

"The work that Taking Root Farms continues to do for adults with developmental disabilities is an invaluable asset to the Richland County community," said Rep. John. "Their commitment to empowering individuals, fostering independence, and creating meaningful opportunities has made a lasting impact on countless lives. I extend my congratulations on receiving funding through the State Capital Budget, which will help ensure they can continue their mission of uplifting, supporting, and inspiring adults with developmental disabilities for years to come."

Through this bill, Ohio House Republicans prioritized investing in Ohio's future by expanding access to education and healthcare through new facilities or upgrades to existing ones, improving parks and roadways to better connect communities, and strengthening local facilities across the state by providing necessary funding for enhancements. This bill now heads to the Governor for consideration.

Senators host news conference on protecting Ohioans from rising electricity costs

Senators Mark Romanchuk (R-Ontario) and Paula Hicks-Hudson (D-Toledo) held a news conference yesterday to discuss the Electricity Forecast Integrity Act.

The support for Senate Bill 457 comes from a wide range of groups including the Buckeye Institute, the Ohio Manufacturers' Association, Ohio Consumers' Council, and the Northwest Ohio Aggregation Coalition.

"This is a simple bill," Sen. Romanchuk said. "You should only pay for the actual cost, not the projected cost from inflated forecasts."

Inflated forecasts raise electricity prices and overstate the need for new transmission investments and new generation that may not actually be needed. The Electricity Forecast Integrity Act encourages more accurate forecasting to protect consumers.

"I'm proud to join Senator Hicks-Hudson on this bipartisan effort to keep money in Ohioans' wallets," he continued. "I look forward to seeing more support coalesce around our effort."

SB 457 was introduced and waits to be referred to committee.
