Field of Honor marks 25 years since September 11

ONTARIO — Hundreds of American flags moved in the September breeze last Friday, each carrying a name, a story or a sacrifice. Many in the crowd choked back tears as memories of Sept. 11, 2001, returned — the burning towers, debris falling from the sky and the images of a day that forever changed the nation.

Twenty-five years after the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, the Kiwanis Club of Mansfield's Field of Honor brought the community together to remember those who were lost, recognize those who answered the call to serve and honor the men and women who continue that service today.

The ceremony was held at the Area Agency on Aging, 2131 Park Ave. W., where the Field of Honor created a patriotic backdrop of American flags dedicated in memory or honor of veterans, active-duty military members, first responders and others.

This year's ceremony carried added significance as the nation marked the 25th anniversary of the attacks that killed thousands and forever changed the lives of countless others.

Kiwanian Bob Miller welcomed those gathered and read the dedications attached to the flags, putting names and individual stories to the rows of red, white and blue surrounding the ceremony.

Rev. El Akuchie offered the invocation, remembering not only those who died on Sept. 11, but the first responders who ran toward danger while others were running away. His prayer also recognized the dangers, trauma and burnout first responders continue to face in their service today.

The Richland County Honor Guard presented the colors, followed by the national anthem performed by Miss Ontario Teen Volunteer Morgyn Beasley.

Mansfield Mayor Jodie Perry then reflected on how vividly she still remembers that September morning.

"I'm not sure how many of you would remember what the weather was like on August 11, 2001, or July 11, 2001," Perry said. "But I think for those of us who lived through it, we'll never forget what the weather was like on September 11, 2001."

She remembered the bright blue sky and beautiful morning — an ordinary day that quickly became anything but ordinary.

Perry described Sept. 11 as one of the defining moments in life when there is a clear "before" and "after." Before attending the ceremony, she pulled out the journal she kept in 2001 to compare what she remembered with what she had written that day.

At the time, Perry was working at Ashland University and had stepped away for a quiet morning without the television on. Her father called around 10:15 am and asked what she thought about what was happening.

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Volunteers attend 30th Annual Earth Stewardship Celebration

MANSFIELD — For 30 years, volunteers across Richland County have picked up litter, planted flowers, cleared trails and rolled up their sleeves to make their communities a little better than they found them.

Last Thursday evening, many of those efforts came full circle as community organizations and volunteers gathered at DLX in downtown Mansfield to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the Earth Stewardship Celebration.

The event celebrated the community partners who spent the spring and summer picking up litter, planting flowers, removing invasive species, painting fire hydrants and improving public spaces throughout the county. The evening offered an opportunity to look back at the program's history while recognizing the people continuing that work today.

Over the first 29 years, the Earth Stewardship Celebration recorded more than 808 projects involving 66,783 volunteers. Those volunteers contributed an estimated \$2.2 million worth of time, with total community contributions exceeding \$2.6 million when donated materials and sponsorships were included.

"This year marked the 30th anniversary of the Earth Stewardship Celebration, a program that began three decades ago through the

Pressure is a singular story taking place right before D-Day. General Eisenhower (Brendan Fraser) is anticipating the weather for this eventful day and hires a top notch meteorologist named James Stagg (Andrew Scott) who will make the weather favorable for the invasion.

The movie is very interesting from a historical standpoint and is one of those difficult to review films because it feels like a short play (which it is based on) and not very rewatchable.

The events of the movie are very interesting though and its great to see the back and forth between Stagg and a rival meteorologist who is extremely confident in his predictions and Stagg

does not trust him.

Fraser does fine work as Eisenhower, he commands the screen though never disappears into the role.

As D-day gets closer and closer, the tension amps up and the scenes showing the rival forecasts are good because of the historical events.

Pressure is a good film if you are a fan of history and the events surrounding World War II. I cannot quite recommend this based on the fact that some more engaging scenes and rewatchability would have helped. A solid, well made and well acted film though.

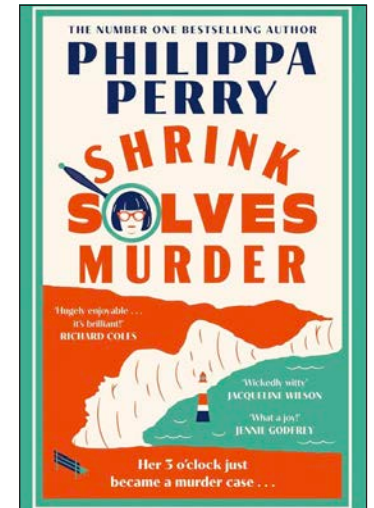

Voter registration deadline for general election is October 5

The deadline to register to vote or change an address or name for the Nov. 3 general election is Monday, Oct. 5. The Richland County Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm. The office is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave., Suite 101 in the Longview Center. After 4 pm, those registering must use the entrance at the lower-level back parking area at the southwest corner of the building.

Those registering to vote must be either a native U.S. citizen or a

naturalized citizen of the U.S., be a resident of the State of Ohio 30 days before an election and be a minimum of 18 years of age on or before the date of the General Election on Nov. 3, 2026.

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person. Voters currently registered in Ohio may change their address online at VoteOhio.gov, but must do so by the Oct. 5 deadline.

In addition to the board of elections office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at any Richland County library branch, all city and village hall offices, The Bureau of Motor Vehicles Office, The Department of Human Services, The Richland County Courthouse (Treasurer's Office) all area high school offices.

Registration forms may also be obtained at vote.richlandcountyoohio.gov or be requested by mail. Contact the board office at 419-774-5530 to have a form mailed. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days before election day.

She had no idea what he meant.

After turning on the television, Perry watched the events unfold. Having moved from Washington, D.C., only a year earlier, she immediately thought of friends and family in the area. Then she watched as the second World Trade Center tower fell.

For many Americans, she said, the idea of an attack happening on American soil was something for which they had no language.

"Unfortunately, it's one that we're all fluent in now," Perry said.

Twenty-five years later, she reflected that life has returned to normal in many ways — but in others, it never has, particularly for those directly affected by the attacks.

Col. Jack W. Johnson, commander of the 179th Cyberspace Wing at Mansfield Lahm Air National Guard Base, brought another perspective to the anniversary — one shaped by a military career that began shortly before Sept. 11 and now places him at the helm of a mission designed to confront a very different kind of threat.

Johnson entered the Air Force through Officer Training School in September 2000 and later deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom and operations in Afghanistan.

"Looking back twenty-five years, there's a lesson in it for me, the threat we faced changed and America adapted," Johnson said. "That lesson is just as relevant today."

He pointed to the transformation of the 179th as an example of that adaptation.

"Our lives—and our military—are now extraordinarily dependent upon technology and our adversaries understand those dependencies," Johnson said. "That's why what is happening right here in Mansfield matters. For generations, this community could look up and see the 179th's flying mission. Today, much of our mission is invisible, but it is no less important."

The 179th, made up of approximately 1,000 personnel, now serves as the Air National Guard's first cyberspace wing. Johnson assumed command in June.

For Johnson, the wing's new mission also carries a personal connection to where he was 25 years ago.

"Our new mission is ultimately about leveraging technology to dominate the airspace anywhere in the world," he said. "Twenty-five years ago, I was working behind the scenes, looking at computer screens and trying to understand what was happening in America's skies. Today, I have the privilege of leading Airmen in Mansfield who work behind the scenes to help America control the skies of the future."

But Johnson's message ultimately returned to remembrance — and to the generations of Americans who have served since that September morning.

"Today, I get to stand here as the commander of the 179th Cyberspace Wing and tell you something I could not have known then: We made it. America endured," Johnson said. "And right here in Mansfield, another generation of American Airmen stands ready for whatever comes next."

On the 25th anniversary, Johnson asked those gathered to remember those who were lost and honor those who served and continue to serve.

"Be proud of our nation and the communities they served and then go live a life worthy of their sacrifice. Treasure today, tomorrow is not promised," he said.

Keynote speaker Doug Theaker continued that message of remembrance with a tribute honoring those who have served, those who have been lost and the men and women who continue to protect their communities and country.

Theaker asked the crowd to consider, "Where were you on that fateful day?" and offered a sweep of history from Lexington and Concord to Iwo Jima, Vietnam, and 9/11.

"God help us so that we never forget what took place on that day," he said. "We are the home of the free because of the brave."

Recalling the courage of firefighters on 9/11, Theaker noted, "As people poured out of the burning buildings, who was going in? The firefighters."

The ceremony concluded with Douglas Keppler playing the bagpipes, providing a solemn close to an afternoon centered on remembrance and service.

Throughout the Field of Honor, the flags served as more than a patriotic display. Each represented an individual story — veterans of World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Afghanistan and other conflicts; current military members; first responders; and those who died on or as a result of the Sept. 11 attacks.

For Perry, remembering the events of 25 years ago also means remembering what happened afterward.

In the days, weeks and months following Sept. 11, she said, Americans needed one another.

That lesson, she said, remains worth remembering today.

"On a day like today when we pause to remember what happened, may we be reminded that we are always stronger when we are working together."

partnership and dedication of organizations committed to making our community a better place to live, work and play," said Zoe Baumberger of the Richland Soil and Water Conservation District.

That legacy continued in 2026.

This summer alone, 297 volunteers representing 22 organizations contributed 1,102 hours of service. Together, they painted 13 fire hydrants, collected at least 48 bags of trash, planted 1,700 flowers, disposed of approximately 300 pounds of scrap metal and removed invasive plants from natural areas.

Thousands of unwanted tires were also collected through community cleanup efforts.

Projects stretched across Mansfield, Shelby, Ontario and other areas of Richland County and included everything from neighborhood litter collection to environmental restoration.

At Oxbow Woods near Finnigan's Run Dog Park, BlueScope Recycling partnered with the Richland County Park District for a May 15 cleanup. Employees and park district staff removed debris and invasive plants and cleared old structures from the property. Approximately 360 pounds of recyclable material was recovered during the project.

Downtown Mansfield's annual beautification effort continued to grow as well. What began years ago with roughly 60 planters, has expanded to 145 planters and 52 hanging baskets this year. More than 100 donors and volunteers supported the project, along with approximately 15 garden clubs and other community service groups.

Organizers said the project does more than add color downtown. Volunteers develop a sense of ownership in the flowers they plant and continue watching over them throughout the season.

At Gorman Nature Center, 10 volunteers spent a May workday removing approximately an acre of invasive honeysuckle, autumn olive and multiflora rose while clearing roughly 1,200 feet of trail. Volunteers contributed 34 hours of work during the event, with additional invasive-species projects continuing throughout the season.

In Shelby, Marvin Memorial Library participated in its first community cleanup July 31. Fifteen volunteers concentrated their efforts around Black Fork Commons and Veterans Memorial Park, collecting approximately 15 bags of garbage.

One of the season's largest coordinated efforts took place along Mansfield's Springmill corridor.

A four-day cleanup organized by the North End Community Improvement Collaborative brought together 102 volunteers who contributed 616.5 hours of service. Volunteers filled nine dumpsters with trash along the corridor from Mulberry Street to Home Road while also repainting fire hydrants and involving local students in

the work.

Springmill STEM Elementary students tackled another stretch of the neighborhood. Fourth-grade teacher DaVeta Dennis said her students cleaned Springmill Street from Bowman Street to Parker Street.

Environmental education was also part of this year's celebration.

At The Ohio State University at Mansfield, approximately 30 participants learned to identify and control invasive species before putting those lessons into practice on campus.

Ontario High School's Warrior Leadership students continued a community service tradition that has been underway for roughly eight to 10 years. Approximately 20 to 25 students typically participate in the cleanup, working along the commercial corridor and into Culver's Woods. This year's volunteers collected approximately 30 bags of trash.

Another major effort focused on something much larger than litter bags.

The Richland County Regional Solid Waste Management Authority's Tire Amnesty Day, held Aug. 22 at the Richland County Fairgrounds in partnership with the Richland County Farm Bureau, drew 394 vehicles during the four-hour event.

Organizers filled three 53-foot semi-trailers with an estimated 3,500 to 4,000 passenger tires, along with four 40-yard containers holding large agricultural tires.

Shelby's annual community cleanup added to the countywide effort. The Shelby City Health Department collected approximately nine dumpsters of furniture, trash and other unwanted materials as well as approximately 200 tires. The department also partnered with Shelby City Schools' Eco Whippets to collect electronics.

Ward 5 residents and businesses continued their own neighborhood cleanup initiative in Mansfield. The effort began nearly five years ago after litter and illegal dumping emerged as concerns among residents. Volunteers now select a different area of the ward each month from spring through fall.

Ward 5 Councilman Aurelio Diaz said the effort demonstrates that residents don't have to accept litter and dumping as permanent parts of their neighborhoods.

"It shows all the residents that you're empowered to make your neighborhood look as beautiful as you want it to be," he said. "Even if people continue to dump in it, we can still continue to make it better."

The 2026 celebration also included projects involving Kingwood Center Gardens, Richland Public Health, the Richland County Farm Bureau, Rotary Club of Mansfield and other community partners.

Supporting those efforts was a \$13,000 grant from the Richland

County Regional Solid Waste Management Authority. Funding was used in part to provide \$100 gift cards to local businesses through drawings for participants in monthly volunteer projects and during the anniversary celebration.

The Earth Stewardship Celebration is coordinated through a steering committee representing organizations including Richland Soil and Water Conservation District, Richland County Regional Solid Waste Management Authority, Richland Public Health, Mansfield City Parks and Recreation, Richland County Park District, Marvin Memorial Library, Downtown Mansfield Inc., NECIC, The Ohio State University and Ohio State University Extension.

Richland County Commissioners Cliff Mears and Daryl Banks were also recognized during Thursday's anniversary gathering.

While the evening celebrated three decades of work, organizers repeatedly pointed toward the future — inviting new volunteers, organizations and community partners to become involved.

Every project, Baumberger said, represents people willing to invest in the place they call home.

"Every bag of litter collected, every flower planted, every tree cared for, and every volunteer hour contributed has helped make Richland County an even stronger and more vibrant community."

Thirty years after the effort began, that simple idea remains at the heart of the Earth Stewardship Celebration: Plant Pride, Not Litter.

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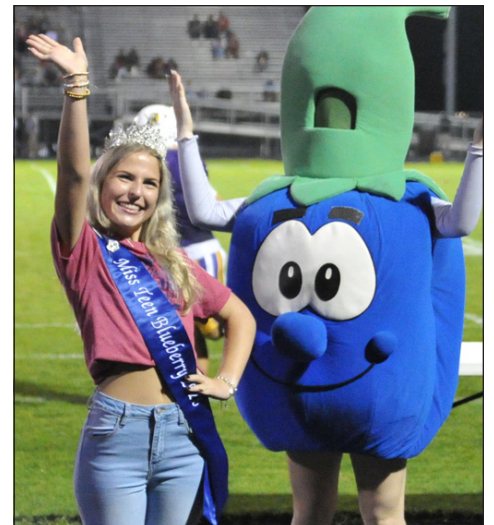

Community's generosity pays off wheelchair-accessible van

ONTARIO — What began as one Ontario couple's need for reliable, wheelchair-accessible transportation has grown into something much bigger — a community effort they now hope will help other families facing the same challenges.

Jeff and Joni Davis recently announced that their 2023 Chrysler Voyager has been paid in full, thanks to an outpouring of support from friends, neighbors, their church family, community members and local organizations.

"We're both still in awe and can't believe the generosity of so many people," Joni said.

Among those contributing to the effort were the Consolidated Electric People Fund, with assistance from Mike Ziegelhofer, and an anonymous local nonprofit whose contribution helped eliminate the remaining balance on the vehicle.

For the Davises, however, paying off the van is not the end of the story.

With their own transportation needs met, the couple hopes to turn the generosity they received into an ongoing effort to help others who need accessible wheelchair transportation. They are exploring the possibility of partnering with an established local nonprofit and adding their van program to its existing services or eventually obtaining their own 501(c)(3) nonprofit status.

Their goal is to help another individual or family obtain a wheelchair-accessible van or assist with the cost of installing a wheelchair lift or ramp in a vehicle they already own.

"We'd love to bless another family or person in need that needs a wheelchair van or wheelchair ramp put in an existing vehicle," Joni said.

They are also working to establish a Venmo account so people can continue contributing to the effort. In the meantime, a savings account has been established at First Federal Bank of Ohio, 1728 W. Fourth St. in Ontario. Donations can be made at the branch by asking to deposit funds into the Jeff & Joni Davis Van Fund.

The couple is also seeking suggestions from the community about established non profit organizations that might be interested in partnering with them as the effort moves forward. Those with questions about donating or information about a potential nonprofit partnership may contact the Davises at 419-545-6646.

Joni said the response has been especially meaningful because so many people and organizations stepped forward simply because they wanted to help.

"I wish we had a way to thank each and every person and organization that contributed and are still contributing," she said.

She also credited local news coverage with helping the family's story reach people who were in a position to make a difference.

"We're so thankful to the Tribune-Courier and other media outlets for helping share our story about the need and getting this vehicle," said Joni.

Now, the Davis family hopes the same community spirit that helped put them behind the wheel of a fully paid wheelchair-accessible van can be passed along to someone else.

"It's great with all the negativity going on and then you hear a story as great as this one because of the kind people that are still willing to do great and generous things," said Joni.

Ohio ranks third nationally for sports participation

With almost 350,000 high school student-athletes during the 2025-26 school year, Ohio ranks as the third-largest state for high school sports participation in the annual NFHS High School Athletics Participation Survey, trailing only Texas and California.

Ohio ranked in the top five nationally in participation of most sports and is now the national leader in the number of high schools that have a team in three sports, including girls wrestling (525), girls bowling (505) and boys bowling (517). The continued growth of girls wrestling and girls flag football in Ohio and across the country helped lead to a national record for total

high school student-athletes.

Ohio's 347,994 total student-athletes last school year ranked third behind Texas (911,405) and California (859,022). Following Ohio were Illinois (326,756), Pennsylvania (315,647), New York (312,563), Florida (311,233) and Michigan (295,634).

"We are very proud that Ohio is among the national leaders in high school sports participation," said OHSAA Executive Director Doug Ute. "This is a tribute to the teams and programs

that our member schools have built and the coaches who create those fun and educational opportunities for kids. The tradition of high school sports in Ohio is amazing and so many kids grow up waiting for their turn to play for their school."

Ohio ranks seventh in the country in total population. There are currently 813 member schools of the Ohio High School Athletic Association.

Among boys sports in Ohio, the top sports for participation include football (40,302), track and field (28,964), baseball (20,892), basketball (20,246) and soccer (17,540).

Top sports for Ohio girls participation include competitive spirit/cheerleading (26,635), track and field (23,739), volleyball (19,867), soccer (14,605), softball (13,977) and basketball (12,879).

The NFHS, based in Indianapolis, Indiana, is the national leadership organization for high school sports and performing arts activities.
